Hoopeston library project gets \$250,000 in state funding

The state will help the Hoopeston Public Library expand and become handicapped-accessible.

Head librarian Lou Graham was notified last week that the library will receive a \$250,000 construction grant. The grant is one of \$3.2 million in money given to 21 libraries in the state.

The funds are awarded through the Secretary of State's Live and Learn program with funding generated by automobile title fees.

The library's expansion project includes an addi-

tion on the south side which would have a ground-level entrance and elevator, bringing the building up to standards in the Americans With Disabilities Act.

The library district board has a preliminary design for the project. They are expected to meet this week to review the plans and costs.

The addition and modifications are expected to cost approximately \$1 million which will be covered by the grant and money from the Charlotte Ann Russell and Wilson Bessellieu trust funds.

IHHA Scholarship

Johnson's committee assignments set

U.S. Rep. Tim Johnson (R-IL 15th) has been named to the General Farm Commodities Subcommittee of the House Agricultural Committee. Johnson said he re-

ceived his first choice of a subcommittee assignment in Agriculture.

As a member, Johnson will be involved in the drafting process for the 2002 Farm Bill. Additionally, Johnson said he would be able to represent the agricultural interests of his district because the subcommittee has jurisdiction over the Federal Crop Insurance Program and issues surrounding Illinois' major crops of corn and beans.

Johnson was also assigned to two subcommittees under the House Transportation Committee, including both the Aviation and Highways and Mass Transit subcommittees. These assignments will allow him to protect the Blooming and Champaign airports, Johnson said, and will allow him to be a major voice for the interstate and highway systems.

As of Friday, Johnson was still awaiting assignments under the House Science Committee.

Little known facts listed about Social Security program

- The first Social Security benefits were one-time, lump sum payments made in January 1937.
- COLAs (Cost of Living Allowances) were first paid in 1975 as a result of a 1972 law. Prior to this, benefits were increased periodically by special acts of Congress.
- Since November 1936, more than 390 million different Social Security Numbers have been issued.
- Women represent 98 percent of those receiving Social Security benefits as parents with a child in their care.
- The poverty rate among elderly women is 13 percent but without Social Security it would be 52 percent. Elderly men have a poverty rate of seven percent; without Social Security it would be 41 percent.
- The poverty rate for aged women was 18 percent in 1975. By 1995, the poverty rate for aged women had decreased to 13 percent.



- The fastest-growing segment of American's older population are those who are at least 85 years of age. Since 1970, the number of people aged 85 and older has more than tripled.
- Disabled workers and their dependents account for 14 percent of the total Social Security benefits paid.
- The youngest age that one can retire and receive full benefits will rise. People born in 1960 and later will collect full Social Security benefits at age 67.
