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Grant supervisor hopes to leave 'em laughing when she goes

Carol Flint has always been quick with a smile, ready to laugh. That's the last thing she wants people to see when she steps down as Grant Township Supervisor next week.

"I like to keep my emotions inside," she said. "I want to walk out that door with a smile on my face."

Walking out the door after newly-elected supervisor Bill Boose is sworn in May 7 won't be easy for the woman who has spent most of the last 19 years overseeing Grant Township's government.

Flint was appointed to the job on Aug. 15, 1972, to replace Helen LaBounty who was moving from Hoopeston. A newcomer to Hoopeston, she was employed at Citizens Federal Savings & Loan at the time, township assessor Art Richoz encouraged her to throw her hat into the ring. "That dear, old neighbor said I'd work Monday to Friday, 8:30-4 and be home nights, weekends and holidays with my family," Flint said. "Sometime during the first year, I asked myself "who was he kidding?"

From that beginning, Flint ran for supervisor four times. "It's political but you forget it's political until it's election time," she said.

One of her first tasks was to write rules and regulations covering the township general assistance program. She spent two days in Bloomington township learning the ropes from Maxine Schultz, president of the supervisors' board. Schultz later tapped Flint's knowledge to be an instructor to other supervisors and put her on the supervisors' board.

During her tenure, Flint has seen many changes in township government at the state and local levels. She helped write a new supervisor's manual, Work Fair manual and emergency procedures manual. Locally, she has been a driving force behind the ambulance and fire protection districts and was instrumen-

tal in moving the township building from its previous location at 200 E. Penn to its current home at 525 S. Market.

While she has accomplished much as supervisor, it is the memories of people that Flint will cherish most. "One of the things I'm going to do is write a book about the people who've touched my life," she said.

One of those was Louise Gall, a woman who walked Hoopeston's streets with a shopping cart. "She wasn't someone a lot of people paid any attention to," Flint said. One day, Gall stopped into the township office to have Flint examine a bank statement. That was the beginning of a friendship that lasted until Gall's death several years ago.

Most, but not all, the people Flint has met as supervisor have been kind. "I only had somebody threaten to hit me twice," she said, laughing. "I didn't think that was too bad for almost 19 years."

Looking back, Flint said it's hard to believe it has been nearly 19 years since she took over the reins. "When you say 19 years, it doesn't seem like it's been that long but when I look at pictures, I know it's been a while," she said.

Township clients have said the office won't be the same without her, but Flint, waxing philosophical, said that's all right. "It's not going to be the same," she said. "It's not meant to be the same. Bill needs to make his own footprints."

Retirement will mean spending time with grandchildren, finding new ways of connecting with people and acting as Hoopeston's newest first lady.

First, though, Flint has to leave her office without getting too emotional. "I'll just go out the door laughing like an idiot like I always do," she said.
