Reorganization <u>allows more contests for boys of summer</u>

The boys of summer have games to play this year, thanks to a reorganization effort by the Hoopeston Colt and Pony leagues.

The Hoopeston Summer Baseball Association, combining both leagues, was formed after last year's season, said Tom Spear, association vice president of the Pony League and team coach. Declining participation in

Colt League teams face similar competition from teams in Watseka, Gilman and Tri-Point, he said.



drive their kids sometimes three and four times a week," he said. "Even when gas was close to \$2 a gallon, they didn't complain."

The association also has a dedicated board of directors, led by Vickie Means, president; Dave Musk, treasurer; Donna Spear, secretary; Spear; Lenny Davis, Colt League vice president and coaches/board members Al Carl, John Smiley and Rod Burkett. Long-time sponsors help, too, with Hoopeston Express Lube and the Hoopeston AMVETS post sponsoring Pony League teams and Fence-It-In and Ravens Trucking sponsoring Colt teams. With dedicated volunteer parents, coaches, directors and sponsors, the only thing the association is short on is cash.

To meet that need, the group recently held a pancake day. It also receives funds from the Grant Township United Community Fund. Plans are underway to sell signage space at the field. A 2/x4' sign with a business logo is \$75 for the first year and \$50 annually after that, Spear said. So far, 25 to 30 businesses have expressed interest in the signs but the field has room for about 75, he said.

Money raised will be used to improve the diamond.

Although the field is in a city park, limited municipal resources means more improvements will fall to the association. For example, this year, the association hopes to fix the backstop to stop foul tip balls from flying to the veterans' memorial. "We're trying to be financially responsible to the community," Spear said.
