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## Hoopeston Area students learn about new Explorer program

Hoopeston area young people who are interested in a career in law enforcement have a new group that will test that interest.

Eight Hoopeston Area High School students attended an informational meeting Tuesday night about an Explorer post geared to law enforcement. The program, under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, will be sponsored by the Hoopeston Police Department and is open to boys and girls ages 14-20.

Officer Jeremy Welch will coordinate the program. Welch has previous experience working with young people as a counselor at Lincoln's Chal-

said Larry Smith of the Boy Scouts. Although Explorer members will determine the course of the group, some suggestions include touring the Public Safety Building and perhaps tactical training using the local paintball field, said Police Chief Mark Drollinger. Other facets of law enforcement may eventually include working with police and taking reports.

"The chief and I have had lengthy discussions on what we will and won't do and there is no lid on the jar," said Welch.

Drollinger praised those who attended, saying peer pressure sometimes makes law enforcement seem a poor career choice. "You're going to be called a narc and a rat," he said. "I've been there, I know."

> the school system, Smith said. "I think that will make it a better post," he said.

Although Welch and Drollinger plan the program to be informative and fun—and perhaps prove a pool for future police officers—students will also be held to a high standard. "This is not so you can find out what the cops think about you as you walk down the street," Drollinger said. "This isn't going to be a "get out of jail free" card for you." However, "I'm not looking for altar boys and altar girls," he added.

Students will undergo background checks similar to those used before hiring officers and will be expected to maintain good scholastic standing.
