Ambulance purchased with grant funds to be bought by city

Hoopeston officials plan to purchase an ambulance bought by Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital.

The \$84,500 ambulance, purchased by the hospital with a grant from Southern Illinois University, will be purchased by the city when the hospital provides documentation that the university is aware the hospital planned to turn the vehicle over to the city.

Under the ambulance service contract between the hospital and city, the city retains ownership of the ambulances said hospital board chairman Russ Leigh at Tuesday's city council meeting.

Ambulance committee chairman Alderman Don York said the ambulance was purchased by the hospital because the grant, which the city was not eligible to apply for, covered the cost. Also, he said, an ambulance purchased through the normal bidding process would have cost more than \$100,000.

By paying for the ambulance, the city keeps some of the \$103,000 earmarked for a new ambulance and the hospital gets money to help its cash flow.

The council unanimously approved buying the ambulance after it receives a letter from Southern Illinois University.

In unrelated action, the council discussed several road and street issues.

Engineer Jay Dingee of Sodeman & Associates, said three bids were received for the 2002-03 street improvement project, which includes resurfacing the east end of Main and one block of Fourth St.

The low bid was from Cross Construction of Urbana, for \$117,777.50, \$19,000 under the estimated project cost, Dingee said.

The bid is expected to be approved at the April 16 council meeting.

In related discussion, Alderman Rod Kaag,

street/alley committee chairman, said specifications for the city's sidewalk program will be available at city hall until May 6. Bids will be opened at 5 p.m. during a committee meeting on that date.

The council then approved spending additional money on a dump truck to cover the cost of adding a plow.

The council had already approved \$56,000 for the truck but during recent snow storms, "one of our plows basically disintegrated," Kaag said. To put a plow on the dump truck will cost about \$200 over the \$60,000 budgeted for a truck, he said.

In the last action, Kaag recommended the city move forward on the final phase of repairs to the new landfill road next to Casey's General Store on Rt. 9. Bids will be accepted on the work, which is estimated to cost about \$80,000.

In unrelated business, the council:

- discussed a drug policy to cover new hires and existing employees. The cost would be \$42 per random test and \$64 for new hires, said Alderman Kevin Davis. The proposed policy includes city officials but city attorney William Nelson said the policy, which includes termination for positive drug tests, needs to be reexamined since officials cannot be fired. Davis said he would consult Midwest Service Corporation, a drug testing company, about the problem.
- gave its blessing to a request from the Visioning for the Future committee to apply for a \$25,000 Community Development Assistance Program grant. Only governmental agencies may apply for the grants. If approved, grant money is expected to be used for an economic mapping program as well as a Peace Corps Fellowship program.
- learned signs may be placed on Rtes. 1 and 9 directing traffic to Hoopeston Community Memorial
