Auto theft, vandalism among crimes increasing last year

The number of auto theft, vandalism, **YEAR/CRIME** drug arrests and sexual assaults in Hoopeston all rose in 2003.

The Hoopeston Police Department released crime statistics for last year, which also showed that the number of Robbery domestic batteries, aggravated batteries, burglaries, thefts and traffic accidents decreased.

Police made 45 drug arrests last vear, which is a five-year high, said Total* Chief Mark Drollinger at the January Neighborhood Watch meeting.

An increased number of arrests does not mean more drug traffic is going on but indicates officers are more vigilant Auto Theft in arresting people, he explained.

"With methamphetamine the way it Arson is, we're going to see an increase" (in drug arrests)" he said. "It's taken over and is a black cloud over the city."

Police received five reports of sexual assault, up from non last year and four Drug Arrests in 2001.

A total of 12 auto thefts were reported in 2003, up from 4 in 2002. One arson was reported last year.

None were reported in 2002. Vandalism was also up slightly, with 116 last year and 105 in 2002.

A total of 141 traffic accidents were reported last year, a five year low, Drollinger said. In 2002, police handled 150 accidents.

Compliance officers, in charge of issuing tickets for junk cars and other nuisance ordinance violations, cited 530 people in 2003, up from 498 in 2002. Investigators were assigned 343 cases in 2003 and have a 51 percent clearance rate. "We'd like to see better but that's a livable number," Drollinger said, explaining that the clearance rate includes cases that are difficult to solve, like hit-and-run accidents.

Investigators last year handled 315 cases with a 49 percent clearance rate.

In-service calls were at 4,461 last year, Drollinger said. The number is down for the second year in a row, from 4,925 last year and 5,213 in 2002.
