Trick-or treaters will be out in force Sunday night. To make the evening fun and safe, Children's Safety Zone has the following tips for youngsters, their parents and homeowners.

Trick-or-Treaters

- Carry a flashlight
- •Walk, don't run.
- •Stay on sidewalks
- •Stay in familiar neighborhoods
- •Don't cut across yards or driveways.
- •Make sure costumes don't drag on the ground.
- •Shoes should fit (even if they don't go with your costume)
- Avoid wearing masks while walking from house to house.
- Carry only flexible knives, swords or other props.
- •If no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic
- •Wear clothing with reflective markings or tape.
- Approach only houses that are lit.
- •Stay away from and don't pet animals you don't know.

Parents

- •Make children eat dinner before setting out.
- •Young children should be accompanied by an adult.
- •If children go on their own, be sure they wear a watch, preferably one that can be read in the dark.
- •Purchased costumes should be made of flame-retardant material.
- •Older children should know when to be home.
- •Parents should know where children are going.
- •Although tampering is rare, tell children to bring the candy home to be inspected before consuming anything. Look at the wrapping carefully and toss out anything that looks suspect.

Homeowners

•Make sure your yard is clear of such things as ladders,

hoses, dog leashes and flower pots that can trip the young ones.

- •Pets get frightened on Halloween. Put them up to protect them from cars or inadvertently biting a trick-ortreater.
- •Battery powered candles are preferable to a real flame.
- •If you do use candles, place the pumpkin well away from where trick-or-treaters will be walking or standing.
- •Make sure paper or cloth yard decorations won't be blown into a flaming candle.
- •Healthy alternatives for trick-or-treaters include packages of low-fat crackers with cheese or peanut butter filling, single-serve boxes of cereal, packaged fruit rolls, mini boxes of raisins and single-serve packets of low-fat popcorn that can be microwaved later.
- •Non-food treats: plastic rings, pencils, stickers, erasers, coins.

Quality education is key to vote

The voters of both the Rossville-Alvin School District and the Hoopeston Area School District face very important questions in Tuesday's election. The outcome of the votes will have a dramatic effect on the education of students in northern Vermilion County. Money and the failure of the State of Illinois to adequately fund its schools is the driving force behind both votes.

For the people in the Hoopeston Area District, the choice is very simple. Are they willing to raise the tax rate by .90/\$100 of assessed valuation to fund the Education fund? The residents of this district have not raised their tax rate to fund schools since the early 1970's. They have benefited from an excellent school system that has operated on the lowest rate in the county for years. If the people vote yes, the tax rate will be nearly equal to what the residents of the Rossville-Alvin District have been paying for some time, and Hoopeston Area schools will remain strong.

The question for the people in the Rossville-Alvin District is much more emotional and complicated. The voters will vote yes or no to deactivate Rossville-Alvin High School. The reason is simple. The district is operating on a nearly \$500,000 deficit budget for this year. Even though 80% of the schools in the state are in deficit spending, Rossville-Alvin is seeking a solution. If the deactivation vote fails, the voters will be asked in April to raise the tax rate by \$1.00.

The rational reasons for deactivating are well documented. The people of the community can retain local control of the district and guarantee that a grade school remains in Rossville. A local Board of Education will still make decisions affecting the tax rate and the education of the students in our district. Statistics show that schools between 350 and 750 do an excellent job of offering the curriculum and activities of a larger school and the quality of a smaller school. R-A students attending either Bismarck-Henning or Hoopeston Area would have the benefits offered by a larger school.

HAHS and BHHS both hosted open houses for the parents and students of RAHS. Both schools did an excellent job of presenting what they have to offer R-A students. The R-A students already share many classes with HAHS and most of their sports with BHHS. The students know each other and have mostly positive experiences to relate from the co-oping of classes and sports.

The emotional issues are not so easy to decipher. Rossville-Alvin has a rich tradition of education in its community. The walls of its well-maintained building are lined with pictures, trophies, and awards proclaiming the honors and achievements of a century of students. Many people who still live in the community are graduates of the schools here and are proud of their education. Others fear that the loss of the high school will cause a decline in the well-being of the community.

The present students who would be affected by the deactivation realize that they would make new friends but the do not want to be separated from friends they have attended school with since kindergarten. Also there is a sense of community in the small student body at R-A that they do not want to lose. Yet they realize that the Rossville-Alvin High School that many reminisce about is gone. Only four sports are offered in Rossville now. Friday night football in Rossville is gone. All music is in Hoopeston. The excellent band that marched in the Homecoming parade this year was Hoopeston's band that included several R-A students.

Whatever the voters decide next Tuesday will greatly impact the education of the students in our communities. Get the facts. Northern Vermilion County people have always offered their students an excellent education. That must never change!

Decide and vote wisely on November 2.
