McDonald's is site of soldiers' reunion after 51 years apart

Frank Aguirre of Lafayette, Ind., was as nervous as a schoolgirl Tuesday. He was about to meet an Army buddy for the first time in 51

Aguirre, who moved to Lafayette a few months ago after living in California, and Fort, of Morton, served in the Korean War. They agreed to meet at the Hoopeston McDonald's at 11 a.m.

Aguirre arrived more than an hour early, bringing to the restaurant a box of pictures of his team. "Where is Charlie," he wondered at 10:55. And again at 11:05 and 11:15. At 11:20, his cell phone rang. Fort was calling from the former Shell gas station to find his compatriot. Within minutes, the two were embracing.

"You've gotten fat,"

Fort said to Aguirre as he hugged his old friend.

As the men looked at pictures of the 1954 Yokosula (Japan) Seahawks football team, both walked down memory lane. "I blocked him one time and damn near killed him," Fort said, pointing at a figure in one of the framed photographs.

"We had a great team," Aguirre said. And a winning one. The Seahawks were largely undefeated but Aguirre remembered one loss, to the Air Force All Stars during the Rice Bowl in Tokyo.

The meeting was Aguirre's idea. The former

longshoreman has been "looking for some of my teammates for the last 30 or 40 years. I kept looking for guys, little by little. I wondered 'where would they be? I just want to see what they're doing."

Aguirre's search has taken him across the United States, either in person or by phone, with trips to Memphis, Tenn., Kansas City, and Arkansas. While many former teammates live in the same general area as they did while in service, most have moved out of the small towns they called home. Others have died.
