Hoopeston Area board names middle, high school principals

The people who will head Hoopeston Area Middle and High School were introduced to the public at Thursday night's Hoopeston Area School Board meeting.

Anne Burton was named as middle school principal, while Larry Maynard will lead the high school.

Burton comes to Hoopeston Area from Potomac High School, where she served as teacher, com-

puter coordinator and assistant principal. Prior to her 18-year stint at Potomac, the Armstrong resident taught kindergarten in Rankin.

Maynard has been at Rantoul High School for the past three years, serving as dean of students and assistant to the principal. Prior to that, the Dwight-area native worked at Judah Christian Junior High and High School.

The two replace Hank Hornbeck who was promoted to superintendent. He and the new principals will begin their duties next month.

While Hornbeck served as principal of both schools, the board "thought we needed to boot a principal back in the middle school," said board President Mark Wagoner.

Teacher Chris Newman, representing the Hoopeston Education Association, said "I think it will make our programs stronger here."

"We're all in agreement about that," Wagoner replied. In unrelated discussion, Hornbeck presented the board with a high school improvement plan designed to bring

up the school's graduation rate, as well as math and reading scores.

Hornbeck said the high school failed to make average yearly progress (AYP) with its 2005-06 graduation rate and so had to come up with a remediation plan. The 54-page plan includes specifics for remedying the graduation rate, along with math and reading scores, which were at acceptable levels.

The plan, which includes teacher training at \$5,000 this year and \$5,000 next year, was developed by a committee including Hornbeck and teachers.

In other discussion, interim Superintendent Don Dean said district finances are in good shape, adding the one area of concern is the transportation fund, which has problems that will need to be addressed, caused by increased fuel prices.

Dean also announced that the district tax rate will drop by about seven cents but that its equalized assessed valuation (EAV) rose only two-tenths of a percent. The small increase means that the district cannot count on more property taxes nor an influx of students and so will be more dependent on state funding. "We're just not having a lot of growth," he said.

While not encouraging, the news is not devastating either. "Right now our finances are sound and we've got a (teachers) contract we can afford," he said.
