Hoopeston council changes legal firm to save TIF dollars

A change in legal counsel will save Hoopeston several thousands of dollars in its Tax Increment Financing (TIF) fund.

At Tuesday's Hoopeston City Council meeting, Alderman Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, recommended cancelling the city's contract with current TIF counsel, Jacobs & Associates, of Bloomington and instead using Kurt Froehlich of Evans, Froehlich, Beth & Chamley of Champaign.

Jacobs & Associates, and a subsidiary, Economic Development Group, cost the city more than \$30,000 per year, while Froehlich's firm charges \$175 per hour. In a meeting with Goodwine and city attorney Paul Manion, Froehlich estimated the city would need to spend \$1,000 to \$5,000 on TIF legal services.

The most recent contract with Jacobs expires in April 2010, Goodwine said.

Between changing firms and the recent elimination of the city's economic developer position, Goodwine estimated the city will save about \$100,000 per year.

In unrelated business, city officials will begin cracking down on abandoned buildings and those in disrepair.

Alderwoman Sue Comstock, head of the civic improvement committee, said action against building owners will have to be prioritized. "We can only tackle one or two at a time," she said, adding tearing them all down would cost in excess of \$200,000.

Comstock said the first priority is a house in the 500 block of East McCracken and buildings owned by Dennis Ballanger on South Market.

Since Comstock announced at the last council meeting that the city would be cracking down on property owners, she said she received several calls from people wondering if their property is on the list.

"If you think you have a problem with your property, then you probably do have a problem with your property," she said.

In related business, Comstock said that according to state law, roofers must be licensed by the state Department of Professional Regulation. To become licensed, roofers must pass a test. Testing fees cost over \$200 each in categories of residential; commercial and industrial; and commercial, industrial and residential. There is an additional \$125 fee to file an application for certification.

In unrelated business, the council:

- Approved annexing property at 1107 S. Second Ave., owned by Frances Troxel.
- Congratulated city workers for their efforts during the National Sweetcorn Festival.
- Heard from Comstock about complaints regarding those who have "perpetual" rummage sales. An ordinance covers rummage sales and is expected to be more strenuously enforced.
- Heard from Alderman Ed Lotz, police committee chairman, that Sgt. Marty Dobkins of the Hoopeston Auxiliary Police, will retire September 18 after 24 years.
- Will hold a special meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday to address a language concern in a resolution regarding the Affordable Workforce Housing development.
- Heard from Jean Minick that more volunteers are needed for an income survey of residents. The survey will determine the city's eligibility for grants. To volunteer, call Minick at 283-7873.
- Heard from Alderman Jeff Johnson, street/alley committee chair, that fall cleanup will begin October 5. Only yard waste and brush will be collected. Concrete will not be picked up and burn barrels will not be emptied.


