Possible funding solutions was referred to the water/sewer committee, but during the public comment section of the meeting, resident Stan Steiner inquired about the city getting drainage district tax funds. Crusinberry said officials will look into that tax.

Regarding Carter's comment that the city will take possession of the former Amvets and Second Chance buildings, and will provide trucking, backfill and some miscellaneous items for demolition, Steiner wondered how it is determined who gets paid prevailing wage on such a project.

Each year, the city agrees to pay prevailing wage on projects that involve tax dollars, such as the ongoing water project and street work. Prevailing wage can be significantly higher than what city employees earn but failure to pay the prevailing wage when needed could result in the loss of state grants and low interest loans for the city.

"The guy in the excavator gets prevailing wage; what about the guy driving the truck," Steiner asked.

Crusinberry replied that he believes prevailing wage does not cover municipal workers.

Talking about the additional cost of prevailing wages, Steiner suggested "It's time for somebody to grow a pair and stop (prevailing wage)."

In unrelated business, the council:

• Waived bidding and approved purchasing a 2015 3500 Silverado 4WD truck from Anthem Chevrolet for not more than \$35,000. The truck, when equipped with a skid unit, will be Hoopeston Fire Department's new brush truck, said Alderman Brandon Hamilton, fire committee chairman.

The city will purchase a skid unit from Quad County Fire Department for no more than \$15,000.

The new truck will replace the department's current 1978-model brush truck.

• Approved the annual appropriations ordinance, which is budgeted amounts plus a five percent contingency.

• Heard from state Rep. Tom Bennett, who discussed Illlinois' financial condition and said he and fellow Republicans are working with Gov. Bruce Rauner on a balanced budget. "We will get a budget...but it seems like it will be a painful project," Bennett said.

During this time, which may include some state employees being let go or not receiving their pay, Bennett said he will not accept a paycheck. "It's not a lot but it's something to help," he said.

• Heard from office manager Loni Gress that Envisionwise, a Champaign/California company, has been approached about taking over the city's web page at a cost of \$125 per month. That amount is less than the \$190 per month the city had been paying.

The business has local ties, as co-president RD Miller is related to Carolyn Gress, she said.
