Grant voters to have new polling place in future elections

Voters in Grant precincts recently learned a secret, if they paid attention to their new voter registration cards.

Local voters received new registration cards more than a week ago, all showing a new voting location as St. Anthony parish hall.

In 2015, Vermilion County Clerk Cathy Jenkins consolidated voting for all Grant precincts in a single location, the McFerren Park Civic Center. She met with election judges in November 2015 to answer questions and allay concerns about going from six locations to a single polling place.

However, complaints arose about the civic center, centering mostly on handicapped-accessibility, including parking, narrow hallways leading to restrooms and uneven surfaces causing problems for walking and for those in wheelchairs and scooters, she said.

"When we first moved to McFerren Park, we were looking at updates to be done to bring the building into compliance with the state regulations," Jenkins said. "Since that time, the necessary improvements haven't been made and we needed to look for a place that passed all of the state regulations for polling places to avoid potential fines."

City officials were aware that Jenkins' office received

complaints about the issues. In order keep the civic center as a polling place, the city would have to pay to have the civic center updated, she said

The parish hall had previously been a polling place, and because it met all the state requirements, the decision was made to move all of Grant voting there.

"St. Anthony's were glad to be an active polling place again and it is much nicer inside for the judges who spend a very long day at the polling place, while being able to accommodate all of the Hoopeston precincts," Jenkins said.

One issue that may continue at St. Anthony's is parking, as Maple School employees use the parish hall parking lot during the school day. "We will be working with St. Anthony in dealing with this concern," she said, adding that early voting and voting by mail are options for those who would rather not worry about delays or heavy turnout on election days.

"With this last series of moves, we should be able to leave everyone where they are ... that is, of course, until the state makes changes to the laws that we will be required to comply, Jenkins said.

"I really hope this will be a positive move for the voters as well as the judges," she added.



City moves forward on prices/proposals for former Baer land

Hoopeston City Council could have information ready in early August to accept bids for one piece of property it hopes to sell.

At the July 5 meeting, aldermen heard from Mayor Bill Crusinberry that the first of three parcels for which bids will be sought is approximately 4.4 acres of the former Baer's Trailer Court property at Rtes. 1 and 9. Bid notices will be published and bids accepted with a price and proposed use for the property.

• Heard from Mike Bane, compliance officer, who reviewed several brick structures in town with retired brick mason Tom Fortier. Bane gave an update on the conditions of the buildings.



Brandon Hamilton had received reports of golf carts being driven after dark without lights. Those doing so can be ticketed and lose the privilege of driving a cart, he said.

- Approved new auxiliary police officers Nicholas Howell of Rossville and Noah Howell of Hoopeston, who both came through the Explorer program, Hamilton said.
- Heard from Ald. Lourdine Florek that the city's aerial and ground water storage tanks will undergo a three-year, warranty-related inspection. The tanks will be drained, inspected, any problems fixed, then refilled and the water tested.

• The inspections may cause more rust in the water system and may slightly lower water pressure, she said.

• Rescinded action taken at the June 20 meeting, awarding a motor fuel tax project to Cross Construction of Urbana. The council then approved a bid from Open Road Construction, also of Urbana, who submitted a lower bid. Initial approval was given because the city has previously worked with Cross but IDOT overrode that reason.
