Firemen, others climb to raise 9/11 awareness, money

The mood of those gathered at Honeywell School for Saturday's Hoopeston 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb was jovial as they signed in, chatted with friends and stretched to limber up.

Several Hoopeston firemen were among those at the event, laughing and kidding as they donned turnout gear and strapped air packs to their backs.

But sometime between Riah Inman performing an a cappella version of the national anthem and TJ Lane's "Amazing Grace" on bagpipes, the mood shifted.

Looking determined, Hoopeston Fire Chief Joel Bird was the first to take to the stairs. He was followed by many of his crew, along with residents spanning from grade school to senior citizen.

The goal was to climb 100 flights of stairs both to remember those who died when airplanes hit the World Trade Center in New York City.

The stair climb was organized by Danny Lane, a Hoopeston native who is a fireman for the Fort Leonard Wood Fire Depart-Tyler.

mostly for fire, police, military and EMS personnel and were done in remembrance of emergency workers who died on 9/11, including 343 firemen, 71 law enforcement officers and eight paramedics and emergency medical technicians.

Last year, Lane and Tyler held smaller stair climb on bleachers at Hoopeston Area High School but this year they decided to open it up to honor the memory of two local emergency workers: Travis McCall, a Hoopeston Auxiliary Police officer, who died in 2015, and Police Chief Mark Drollinger, who died in July.

Proceeds from the climb went to an organization important to both: the Hoopeston Explorers post.

Emergency personnel climbed 110 stories - or 2,223 steps working to save lives at the World Trade Center.

On Saturday, people gladly paid \$25 to for the chance to climb 100 flights.

Laura Lane, Danny's wife, laid out the guidelines before the event. "It's not a race," she


