# Harvest emergency declared; permits available to haul more

Truck drivers carrying agricultural products on Illinois highways are now eligible for free permits to exceed highway weight limits by as much as 10 percent due to an emergency declaration issued by Governor Bruce Rauner on November 5. The declaration is in effect for 45 days. It comes in response to weather-related delays for farmers and grain handlers and will allow for quicker crop transportation now that the harvest is underway.

According to figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Illinois' corn harvest is 17% behind last year's rate and trails the five year average by 11%. The delays have backed up the transportation chain for farmers seeking to bring in their harvest and transport it to storage sites.
