Council approves tax levy, continues office air quality work

A handful of residents attending a public hearing on Hoopeston's 2017 tax levy had no questions or complaints about the 5.9 percent hike in the levy.

While most categories remained the same, the levy for police pensions will increase from the current \$142,000 to \$192,000 to make up for a years-long shortfall due to reporting mistakes.

Until 2015, it was erroneously reported that the city had no non-active members (retired officers or widows) drawing pensions. Because of that, the Illinois Department of Insurance reported the pension fund was overfunded.

With reporting corrected in 2015, the Department of

Insurance then said the pension fund was underfunded by more than \$1 million.

Ald. Brandon Hamilton, in discussing the levy at the November 11 meeting, called the issue "historic errors in reporting of non-active members."

At Tuesday's council meeting following the public hearing, Ald. Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, said the levy is made up funds that are based on a percentage of equalized assessed valuation (EAV) while some, like the pension, are budgeted.

If not for the pension increase, the city's total levy for this year - payable in 2018 - would have been \$6,643 less than last year due to a drop in EAV he said.

The council approved the \$777,705 total levy in a 5-0 vote with aldermen Chad Yaden, Ryan Anderson and Carl Ankenbrand absent.

In other business, officials continue to investigate air quality conditions in the city building that some employees report causing health issues.

Goodwine said he first thought it may have been related to the roof leaking into ceiling tiles. The roof was recently redone and damaged ceiling tiles replaced. "I do think the problem is better," he said.

Other action included having the fire department test for carbon monoxide, which was not detected. Due to a
