For the second year in a row, a single word to describe the year almost ending could be "loss."

Loss of beloved people in the community were two of the biggest events this year.

Brian Hodge's death on May 17 left a hole in the Hoopeston Area school system, as the passing of the 47-year-old athletic director affected both staff and students.

It also affected the community at large as Mr. Hodge was remembered as one who lent a helping hand whenever needed, especially when it came to youngsters.

Hodgey graduated from Hoopeston schools and returned after graduating college to teach, coach and eventually lead the athletic department.

As the community worked to come to terms with Hodgey's death, it was hit by another loss, this time of Police Chief Mark Drollinger on July 6.

Chief Drollinger, 54, lost his battle with oral cancer that was diagnosed in March 2016. Although the cancer and subsequent treatments ravaged his body, neither touched his indomitable spirit, his acerbic wit or his admonition to "be nice to each other."

Chief Drollinger used his stature to teach others about oral cancer, spreading the word through print, radio and other media, all the while focusing on living, spending time with family and friends who gathered to support him.

Sgt. Jim DeWitt was named acting chief and continues to serve in that role as officials see a permanent chief.

This year saw less dramatic losses, as well, as Hank Hornbeck retired as Hoopeston Area Superintendent; Larry Maynard resigned after a decade at the helm of Hoopeston Area High School; and Honeywell School closed its doors after hosting a remembrance open house in May.

The flip side of that, of course, is newness, as Suzzette Hesser was named new superintendent and Marc Campbell as high school principal.

One loss that occurred last year resulted in a resurrection after residents took action.


Hoopeston Police dispatching was ended in 2016 with little fanfare but that changed in January, when residents complained of longer wait times for officers, firemen and ambulances that were then being dispatched through Vermilion County.

Citizens - sometimes as many as 50 - attended Hoopeston City Council meetings, asking aldermen to bring dispatching back. Their wish was granted on March 17 when, after being gone for six months, dispatching was returned to the city.

On the economic front, Hoopeston lost its major department store when Shopko closed in February, but gained two new business, Bricks and Ivy, a sports See 2017 on other side

memorabilia store and Sculpt Fitness, the first business to open in the Willdon Building.

Hoopeston was not the only local community to experience loss this year. In Rossville, longtime Police Chief Bill Shannon retired in April. Chris Kelnhofer, former Hoopeston Police officer, was hired in that position.

Rossville also experienced a loss of many of its stately trees and some property after a tornado went through the village in late May.

Some plans from 2017 will carry over into the new year with hoped-for improvements:

• Hoopeston hopes to get a low-interest EPA loan to fund sewer improvements - and perhaps ease flooding - on the city's north side.

• Ownership of the Essex Building has been passed to Justin Acton, who plans to use the structure for retail sales, as well as storage for his construction equipment.

• Hoopeston Retirement Village Foundation hopes to spur economic growth along the Rtes. 1 and 9 corridor, with preparatory work being done this year and construction following in 2018.

The foundation purchased land between Hoopeston Marathon and Chrysler of Hoopeston, with the intent of building a motel and restaurant there. The foundation was also the winning bidder of former
