## Hoopeston Area students walk out in gun violence protest

Hoopeston Area middle and high school students walked out of class Tuesday morning to protest gun violence in schools.

About 30 high school students and scores of middle schoolers gathered on the track behind the schools, part of a national protest stemming from the February 14 shooting at a Florida school. Sponsored by Women March, the protest lasted 17 minutes, one for each of the 17 victims at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla.

Freshman Clayton Hankins was one of the students taking part in the protest. Hankins walked a distance from his classmates. Dressed in shorts, he went down on one

oped a new web-based crop basis tool that can be used to keep up-to-date on crop basis trends in the area, approving the ability to forecast basis.

During the workshop, attendees will learn how the tool works and how they can use it when making crop marketing decisions.

Mintert is a professor and extension economist in the Department of Agricultural Economics and serves as director of the Center for Commercial Agriculture. He joined Purdue's faculty in 2009 and served as the assistant director of Extension for agriculture and natural resources before taking on his director responsibilities at the Center.

Prior to his time at Purdue, Mintert was a professor, livestock marketing economist, and Extension state leader in the Department of Agricultural Economics at Kansas State University for 23 years. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in agricultural economics from Purdue and a doctorate from the University of Missouri.

He acquired his interest in agriculture while working on his family's farm in the Mississippi and Missouri river bottoms, just north of St. Louis, Mo. Over his career, Mintert has received numerous awards, including Outstanding Extension Program Awards from both the American Agricultural Economics Association and the Western Agricultural Economics Association, in addition to the American Agricultural Economics Association's Premier Forecaster Award for his livestock production and price forecasts. Jim is also the author of more than 200 publications focusing on the economics of the livestock industry.

Thompson joined the department in February 2016 after completing his PhD in Agricultural Economics at Oklahoma State University. His research and extension programs will focus primarily in the areas of production economics and farm management, with a specific emphasis on risk management as it pertains to farm-level decision making.

Thompson has a strong interest in interdisciplinary, applied research with practical implications for producers and other relevant stakeholders. Some of his previous work has involved determining the economic feasibility of alternative technologies and production practices for both crop and livestock producers.

He received several honors from Oklahoma State Uni-

versity and the University of Tennessee. His work has been published in such publications as the *Journal of Dairy Science*, *The Professional Animal Scientist*, the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics*, *Agronomy Journal* and *Journal of Agricultural and Resource Economics*.

Laptops/tablets are not required for the workshop; however participants are encouraged to bring them, if possible, to acquire firsthand experience using the crop basis tool.


