

Nearly-ousted coach named HA athletic director for 2018-19

A man whose job as Hoopeston Area High School basketball coach was in jeopardy in March has been named district athletic director.

Matt Colston submitted his resignation as head basketball coach prior to the March 15 school board meeting. However, after public outcry, the board tabled action on the resignation.

At Thursday's meeting, Colston was named athletic director for the 2018-19 school year. He replaces Michl Kearney, whose resignation as athletic director, was accepted at the March meeting, effective at the end of this year.

Colston has been employed by the district since 2012 and is a high school world geography and history teacher.



In other action, the council:

Responded to questions from residents Stan Steiner and Don Jackson about the city's infrastructure fee and newly -implemented dispatch fee. Jackson asked if both are permanent. "If you look at it, it's only \$19 a month," he said, "but if you look at it long term, that's a lot of mon-

ey," asking why the city did not just raise property taxes.

Ald. Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, said for some things, like the annual audit, officials can tax at the actual cost but that for most categories, taxes are a specified percentage. "Those things are all at the max," he said. He further explained low property values and low property tax lead to a lower equalized assessed valuation and less money for taxing bodies.

Jackson suggested the infrastructure fee should be based on usage so that a high-usage resident "would be paying more of his fair share."

Stan Steiner asked if commercial entities, which use more water, would pay more. "It's more important to (Teasdale) Foods and the hospital than it is to me," he said.

While the fee will not be increased for them, Ald. Lourdine Florek, water/sewer committee chair, said it will be imposed on individuals living in multi-unit structures like Centennial Manor and Parkview Court.

Goodwine said the city budgets \$1,250,000 to provide police protection and dispatch services.

Ald. Brandon Hamilton said police wages and benefits make up 30 percent of the city's budget and eleven percent goes for salary and benefits of dispatchers. In total, more than 70 percent of the budget is taken up by personnel costs, he said.

Crusinberry suggested that, due to lack of revenue from the state and increasing costs, the fees would be permanent. "We do the most we can with the income we have."
