

Council discusses, tables ambulance bids

Hoopeston emergency medical technicians will have to settle for the same old ambulances - at least for a while.

Two bids for a new ambulance were opened at last night's city council meeting.

Foster Coach Company of Sterling, bid with two options. The first option, without a trade-in. was for \$66,528. The second option, including trade-in of a 1987 ambulance, was for \$56,528.

Braun Ambulance of Oakwood, Ohio, submitted a bid of \$73,384 without trade-in.

Mike Eckersley, chairman of the city's ambulance committee, said the Braun bid did not meet the city's specifications, which included offering

fered \$10,000 as the trade-in value, a figure Eckersley thinks might be low. "I think we could get \$18,000 or \$20,000 out of it ourselves," he said. "Good used ambulances are hard to come by."

The council will decide on the matter at its Jan. 18 meeting.

In other action, the council approved three new auxiliary police officers, Kent Hoskins, Kipp Kennett and Scott Reynolds. The city now has 15 auxiliary officers, said police chief Orval Kaag.

Township OKs new price for former offices

A lower price on the former Grant Township building should bring more bidders.

At least that's the hope of Grant Township trustees, who met in special session last night to discuss selling the building.

The appraised value of the structure, at 200 E. Penn, was reduced from \$25,000 to \$15,000 because the building has been "shut down," said township supervisor Carol Flint.

The lowered appraisal means potential buyers can purchase the building for 80 percent of the appraised value, or \$12,000.

Flint said three potential buyers had expressed interest in the building, but not at the \$20,000 purchase price originally required.

Since the original appraisal Dec. 20, one of those parties, a non-profit organization, has

decided not to bid on the building, Flint said.

In a letter to trustees, William R. Kizer, a stateapproved appraiser who performed both appraisals, said much of the first appraisal was based on other commercial property in Hoopeston, Kizer's letter continued to state that "the current commercial market in the Hoopeston area has declined significantly in the last few years."

Flint said barring significant vandalism, the building will not be appraised again. "My understanding is, this is it," she said. "He couldn't justify another appraisal."

Trustees will meet at 7 p.m. Monday to discuss the bid process to sell the building.
