

# Area parents unite to help special children

Hoopeston and Rossville parents joined together last week to share the frustration of getting help for what they call their "special children."

Approximately 10 parents met at the Market Street fire station last Thursday for the first support group meeting of parents whose children have Attention Deficit Disorder or Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADD/ADHD).

Both conditions are caused by the brain's inability to metabolize glucose, a simple sugar. ADD students are daydreamers, according to Chuck Fenwick, Fenwick's son has ADHD, which Fenwick compared to living with a superball.

Fenwick and Tom Kasalis led the meeting. Kasalis has one daughter diagnosed with ADD and another who is being tested.

Both leaders and the parents who attended ex-

pressed frustration, not only with dealing with their children, but with school systems and physicians, as well.

"Schools will try to put you off," Fenwick told parents. "Don't let them."

Hoopeston Area schools have no policy for dealing with ADD/ADHD students. In December, Fenwick requested a study be conducted to learn how many ADD/ADHD students are in the district. Fenwick also asked that the board formulate a policy for dealing with such students. The board tabled the request last month, asking Fenwick to provide more information.

According to those at the meeting, a policy is needed. One woman said her child's kindergarten teacher called the child stupid. "My objective for this child is an education," another mother said tearfully.



HA teachers span the gamut, Fenwick said. "We have some excellent teachers in Hoopeston, teachers who are actively trying to deal with the problem. Then there are teachers on the other end of the spectrum, teachers with 'perfect children.' These teachers are trying to compare their children with our special children."

Fenwick said ADD/ADHD children are not "refugees in society," although they are often treated as such. "I've had teachers and other parents tell me it's the way you handle your kids,"

he said. "That's a crock of bull."

Three things will help such children, Fenwick said: parental management skills, medication and educational intervention. The support group will teach parents not only to better cope with their children, but also with their feelings. "One of the most frustrating things about this is the isolation you feel, like nobody knows what you're going through," Fenwick said. "That's wrong.

The next meeting will be 7 p.m. Feb. 10 at the Market Street fire station.


