Re-enactors provide real flavor to 'Gettysburg' opening

The cannon outside the Lorraine Theatre last weekend was real.

So were the Confederate and Union flags, the guns, the ammunition, the regulation wooden canteen and the woolen uniforms.

In fact, it looked like the Civil War had returned to Hoopeston.

And in a way, it had.

Ten members of the Illinois 35th Regiment reenactment team arrived in full period costume for the opening of "Gettysburg" at the theater.

Three re-enactors - Eugene Bencomo of Oakwood and Charles Gamm and Robert Roth, both of Marshall - were cast in the movie, which, at 4½ hours, is considerable shorter than the real battle, which occurred July 1-3, 1863.

Bencomo is the regiment's commander, dressed in a captain's uniform. "I'm actually a major, but I've never worn the major's uniform," he said.

Members of the re-enactment team waited two

"Gettysburg" is rated PG. It will be at the theater the rest of this week.

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




years between applying for roles and the finished product.

Bencomo applied in 1991 after reading an ad in the Camp Chase Gazette, a national magazine for re-enactors. The men filmed in September 1992 at Gettysburg, Penn. The movie was released by Turner Productions in October 1993.

Bencomo will not forget the experience. "It was fun doing the movie, I'll tell you that," he said. I'd always laugh at those scenes on tv when they'd call for makeup and some little guy would run out and slap the actor with a big powder puff. When we were there and they'd call for makeup, this girl would run out with a big powder puff full of dirt."

Not all the filming was fun, however. One actor had a close call after he accidentally fired a gun at a box of ammunition, Bencomo said. The ammunition went off, catching the actor's beard on fire, he said.

Seeing the movie at the Lorraine was close to what Bencomo experienced on the set. "We couldn't wait for it to come here," he said. "The (sound of) the cannons (in the theater) make your chest hurt. It made me feel like I was back there again."

"Gettysburg" is based on "The Killer Angels," a novel by Michael Shaar. The project was delayed when, in 1988, Shaara died, leading to four years of court battles over the rights. Two studios turned down the project before Turner Pictures accepted it. According to Bencomo, the movie will eventually become a six-hour mini-series before it is released on video cassette.

Since filming finished, members of the group have gone back to what they did before: take part in re-enactments in Illinois and the country. They also do living history performances at schools and clubs, all on a donations-only basis.

The group includes 27 soldiers, mostly from the Union side, as well as 15 women. Members come from Rankin, Oakwood, Danville, Westville, Paxton and Marshall, as well as Covington and Indianapolis, Ind.

The group stays true to the original regiment, which left Illinois in August 1861 from Camp Butler, Springfield, Bencomo said.

The original regiment was comprised of Vermilion and Champaign county residents. "It was all farm communities that went into that regiment," Bencomo said.

Bencomo spends "as much time as I can" on re-enactments. "I love the Civil War," he said. "I've studied (it) since I was seven years old."

The 25-year employee of the Veterans Administration hospital in Danville said he is looking forward to his retirement. His plans are simple. "I'm going to do a lot more re-enactments," he said. "For months at a time."
