Car fire under investigation by state fire marshall

A car-b-q Monday morning is being investigated by the state Fire Marshall's office.

Hoopeston police were called at 5:36 a.m. at 709 S. Market where a car owned by Rhonda Mann was on fire.

The fire is being treated as one of suspicious origin, Chuck Fenwick, Hoopeston fire chief, said last night. "It's entirely possible it was arson," he said.

An investigator from the Illinois State Fire Marshall's office was in Hoopeston Monday and was expected to return today for further investigation

Two unidentified people are still wanted for questioning, Fenwick said. One of those was "readily available" but the other was not, he said.

If the fire proves to be arson, the person who set the fire will be charged "no doubt about it," Fenwick said.

The car's interior was extensively damaged in the fire, Fenwick said. "I won't say that (the car is a total loss), but it's close," he said.

A garage which housed the vehicle was not damaged.

Farms to grow, profits shrink says Purdue economist

Profits for farmers in the next century will grow as fast as drought-stricken corn, according to a Purdue ag economist.

Michael Boehlje of Purdue presented Agriculture 2000 at the Hoopeston Demeter office Friday.

Boehlje's predictions for the next seven years include larger farms and tighter margins, said John Weber of Demeter. The economist sees farms of 2,000 to 3,000 acres. "In order to make a profit, (farmers are) going to have to find more ground to farm," Weber said.

While margins will be tighter, technology will help producers farm smarter, Boehlje told farmers.

Weber said Boehlje's predictions included high-technology farm methods, including the ability to fertilize by acre. An antenna affixed to computerized farm equipment will, via satellite, tell farmers exactly what kind and amount to use. Boehlje predicted land values will increase modestly and farm income will be stable, but lower. Boehlje predicted interest rates leading up to the next century will be lower than the 1980s but higher than what is currently available. Also, he said, the U.S. Gross Domestic Product will experience slow growth - two to 2.5 percent annually.

Specialty crops will help the farm economy. Those crops will include white corn for chips, waxy corn for starch-based products and high-oil corn for livestock feeding.

Weber said Boehlje predicts processed products - crushed products, oil and white corn chips - will replace exporting corn and soybeans.

Consumers of those products will also change as agriculture meets the year 2000, Boehlje told farmers. U.S. food demand will grow about one See "ECONOMIST" on other side.
