

# Drug arrests fund local police computer system

Hoopeston drug users and dealers who have been arrested are making it easier for police to nab other criminals.

The Illinois Forfeiture Law, which allows local law enforcement agencies to confiscate money or possessions of convicted drug dealers and users, has enabled the Hoopeston police department to begin computerizing its operations.

Officer Chuck Moyer is coordinating the computerization process, which is still in the early stages.

The department purchased computer, printer and programs with \$1,000 confiscated in drug arrests, said officer Chuck Moyer, who is coordinating the computerization. Equipment was purchased locally at the Computer Works.

"The idea of the computer is we're going to be able to store all the records," Moyer said. "It will

be faster. It saves us time and that's the name of the game."

The police department's entry into the computer age is starting small, with only one station, but Moyer hopes future drug arrests will allow two to three additional stations for investigations and juvenile cases.

Eventually, the system will be able to track criminals from the initial arrest throughout the judicial process.

Moyer is currently creating computerized versions of forms the police department already uses, from arrest records to crime history reports.

In the future, Moyer hopes to develop a program that will electronically provide information on individual addresses in town, such as the number of calls police have answered at a particular place.

An additional program allows Moyer to reconstruct building floor plans of crime scenes on the computer, then show them in three-dimensional fashion. Streets can also be recreated with the program for accident reports, "which makes it a little bit easier," Moyer said.

The computer system will also be able to check spelling and grammar on reports and will generate identification numbers for cases, eliminating duplication.

All officers will eventually use the computer system. Some are now using training aids to familiarize themselves with the system.

Changing from a typewriter to a computer will not be easy, Moyer admitted. "Most of the guys are going to be nervous about it," he said. "I'm nervous about. To be honest, I don't know how everybody feels about it. They seem interested."

Mover believes by the time the Police station

moves to its new headquarters in the former IGA building, using the computer "will pretty much be second nature to them."

Moyer stressed that no tax money was used for the system. "It was bought by peoople we arrested who've broken the law," he said.

The forfeiture law, in effect approximately two years, allows law enforcement agencies to seize money or property following conviction on drug offenses. "When we have a case, we send it to the state's attorney, who forwards it to the appellate court," Moyer said. A hearing is then held to determine if the law enforcement agency will receive the money or property.

City officials have been helpful in implementing the computer program, especially Chief Orval Kaag and Mayor Bob Ault. "They supported this," Moyer said. "They offered their guidance and assistance, which is really appreciated."
