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# New week brings new talks for Teamsters, Pillsbury

A federal mediator is expected to intervene in talks between members of Local 26 of the Teamsters union and Pillsbury management.

Talks are scheduled to resume today, said Allen Baker, a union steward and member of the bargaining committee. The mediator will meet with union representatives at 5 p.m. in Danville.

Baker believes progress will be made at the bargaining session. "It's closer to getting settled than most people realize," he said.

The two major points of disagreement concern insurance. The company wants to charge employ-

There were no reports of violence on the line over the weekend. Baker credited the Hoopeston police with being "pretty good about the whole deal," adding that while other strikers have criticized the police, "those people don't talk for all of us."
