State funds could help local homeowners if city officials decide to apply for funds.

Two representatives of the Champaign County Regional Planning Commission (CCRPC) spoke at last night's Hoopeston city council meeting, detailing grant programs which could improve the city's sewage treatment plant and perhaps improve some housing in the city.

Ted Jeurissen, CCRPC community development specialist, told aldermen about two grants available to upgrade the city sewer system.

One grant could pay up to 75 percent of the cost to expand the sewer treatment plant, Jeurissen said.

City officials have looked at enlarging the plant from its current capacity of 890,000 gallons to 1.3 gallons.

Mayor Bob Ault said the plant will have to grow for the city to grow. "If we get the opportunity tomorrow to get a new factory - and the good Lord

Area man turns hobby into part time profession

An area man has turned a hobby into a part time profession.

Toby Brown has turned his interest in taking pictures into Imagemaker Photography.

The business is based in Brown's Cheneyville home. "For I don't know how long, I've been doing it out of my dining room," Brown said.

He recently started using a vacant building in Hoopeston as a studio of sorts. The studio "is not as glamorous as it sounds," Brown said. "It's not very cool-looking, but it's nice inside." Jeurissen also explained a grant which, if received, could expand sewer service to the Dice addition. However, he suggested officials first apply to expand the system before adding more to it.


Finally, Scott Rose, CCRPC housing program manager, detailed a grant used to improve the homes of very low to low income people.

That program pays approximately \$14,000 per house for needed improvements, including electrical and plumbing work, as well as checks of the heating system and roof and, when possible, cosmetic repairs.

Before the city can apply for that grant, a survey must be done showing resident interest, Rose said.
