

## Hoopeston Area board; teachers sign two-year contract

The Hoopeston Area board of education Thursday night accepted a two-year contract with the Hoopeston Education Association.

"It was almost a model contract," superintendent Don Dean said. "It took two sessions and about three and a half hours." . . . . .

Under the contract the base teaching salary will increase from \$17,300 to \$18,100 in 1994-95 and \$18,700 in 1995-96.

The maximum experience was also increased by one year in each of three categories for the 1995-96 year. Teachers with a bachelor of science degree will receive credit for up to 16 years; teachers with Masters will receive credit for 18 years, and those with advanced certificates will receive credit for 19 years.

Dean said increasing the maximum experience will help teachers at the top end of the pay scale. Of the district's 115 teachers, 78 are at the top, he said.



However, as the years have passed, Stipp said he's learned that, no matter what, people will come. "People can come out and walk around for an hour, then go home and work in their yard," he said. "It's an opportunity to get out of the house the first weekend of spring."
