Former Hoopeston resident questions president

A former Hoopeston resident participated in a television program questioning President Clinton on issues of the day.

Walter Lee, son of Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Lee, appeared on a recent episode of MTV's "Enough Is Enough."

The program, titled "Forum with the President" focused on crime, drug problems and other issues. Approximately 200 young people, aged 16 to 20, attended the program.

"Many of my generation are very angry and frustrated with the bureaucracy of government and the broken promises of politicians," Lee told Clinton. "You have some really great ideas. but will they continue to materialize and how can we believe that this time, things will be different?"

Clinton responded, "Well, all I can say is you just have to watch and see. Insofar as Congress has worked with me, we've been able to do a large number of the things that I said I'd do when I ran for president."

Clinton mentioned the Motor Voter, Brady gun law and national service initiatives as things he has accomplished.

Hoopeston schools offer Chapter 1 summer program

Hoopeston Area is one of five school districts in Illinois offering special summer school classes.

The district received \$50,000 of a \$250,000 state-wide grant for a Chapter 1 summer program, said Stephanie Rennick, program coordinator.

Chapter 1 is a program offering additional help in reading and math to students who require it.


"We're making progress on the commitments I made to the American people in general and to the young people of this country," he said. "I'm trying to do what I said I'd do."

Clinton said that as a general rule, "cynicism is a cop out because once you become cynical, and say someebody else is not going to do something, that lets you off the hook. And in the end, we can only go forward if we believe in each other until we understand that we can't believe in each other anymore."

Clinton called Lee's question "fair" and said young people have "a lot of reasons to be disappointed" in government leaders. "But we can make a difference if we work at it together," he said. "Neither you nor I will be able to do all the things we want to do, but we can do a lot of things we should do if we'll just get to work on it."

The day after interviewing Clinton, Lee, a student at George Washinton University, appeared on CBS This Morning.

Asked by co-host Paula Zahn whether he believed Clinton's answer, Lee responded, "I guess I'll be waiting and seeing."




The summer program is funded through the state Adult Education office and will offer specialized courses for parents, while providing activities for their children, Rennick said.

initiative, perseverence, caring, team work, common sense and problem solving.

After each day's classes, parents and children will be reunited for a joint activity based on the parenting skill lesson of the day, Rennick said. Parents will also receive 1.5 college credits each

for attending jobs skills classes and classes in budgeting and wise consumerism.

Also, Dr. Richard Elghammer will present a 10week course on "Parenting Skills."

Not all of the summer session will be spent indoors. Several field trips are also planned. Sites will include Danville Area Community College, Krannert Center, the University of Illinois' Art Center and National History Museum, the planetarium at Parkland Community College, Kennekuk Cove and Forest Glen.


