

Front Street project to undergo improvements

There is still hope for residents of Front Street. City officials are looking at ways to improve water drainage in the area, according to Mayor Bob Ault.

"We still have some work to do." Ault said Included in that work is replacing a broken drainage tile behind Stokely. USA and a drain pipe which runs under the railroad switch track.

The drainage tile behind the Stokely plant will be fixed first. Ault said. "I hope we're able to do it within the next 60 days." he said.

Replacing the drainage pipe will take longer. Engineers will examine the pipe within the next two to three weeks. Ault said, with the actual replacement done perhaps later this year.

Problems were discussed at the June 7 city council meeting.

Alacrman Drew Allen, employed by Stokely, told the council that water run-off is "taking out the foundation of the Stokely warehouse."

Engineer Jay Dingec of Sodeman & Associates explained that the drainage area can only hold water in one-third of the area because of a gas main going through the property and because twe-thirds of the basin, the area closest to Main Street, is "too high to do much good."

Also. Dingee told the council that the tile just north of the railroad tracks suffered a "massivetype failure. That becomes an expensive problem if you have to go under the railroad tracks." he said. "It's not in a place you would choose to have a problem."

The city spent \$104,818 on the Front Street project. including the land purchase. easement, legal fees. construction and engineering costs. Dingee said the project was started for two reasons: beautification of the area and to "hold a little water."

Ault said the basin. in a natural. low-lying area. "will still be helpful for water" once improvements are complete.

The project, completed last year, was severly tested during a 100-year storm in April.

Several Front Street residents lost most or all of their possessions when their homes were flooded during the storm.

From pot patch to basin

Before it became a detention basin, the Front Street project was covered with what police agencies call "green, leafy material": marijuana. City officials told the railroad that "if they sold it a reasonable price, we would clean up the mar-


ijuana." said Mayor Bob Ault. The city paid \$3.000 for the ground, and then,


under the supervision of the Vermilion Metropolitan Enforcement Group (V-MEG). removed and disposed of the marijuana.

V-MEG is a drug enforcement group made up of Vermilion County Sheriff's police. Illinois State police and Danville police.

Beside illegal drugs, the area also included dilapidated housing. Ault said. "It needed to be cleaned up."




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Hospital close to having new physician come on board

The purpose in locating the doctor in the hospital is to have him or her cover medical situations during the evening hours.


In other news. Burkett said no date has been set to begin the hospital expansion project, but some pre-construction work has been started and bids are being sought for the work.

• Marti Kaeb, representing the Center for Children's Services, said foster parents are desper-






