The change will especially affect next year's seventh graders, Burkey said, "to keep kids from getting lost in the shuffle."

The transisition from grade school to junior high school was especially difficult for some students. The old system did little to help. Burkey said. "It was othing more than a miniature high school."

In order to accomodate the concept. several changes are being made.

First, students will spend less time at their lockers. Seventh graders will make three to four trips to their lockers instead of seven or eight.

That should eliminate what Burkey called a "chronic problem": students getting to classes on time. "We had to do something," he said.

Also. students will stay together as a class through at least the first three blocks of the day. Next. many electives offered at the school have been dropped, allowing teachers and students to concentrate on basics.

"We were offering too many electives." Burkey said, adding that under the previous system, some students spent less than half their day studying academics. Some students spent much time in elective classes such as shop and speech class.

Finally, subjects will be more integrated. For example, Burkey said, writing will not only be done in the language arts block, but also in history and science.

Also. each student will receive computer training during the language arts block. rather than in a separate class. All students will get equal time on computers and will do actual reports rather than practice copying material from books. "No student will slip through," Burkey said.

The planned changes will make the junior high what Burkey believes it was meant to be. "The high school is more subject-oriented." he said. "The elementary school is more student-oriented. The middle school, ideally, should be half of both."

Few changes are planned for eighth graders under the new system. "We do need to get them ready for high school," Burkev said.

And the format change will do little to solve a problem plaguing the school, that of having junior high and high school students in what is essentially the same building.

"I think everybody. from the school board on down, wishes it didn't have to be that way, but it's a building situation," Burkey said.
