

Patch collection shows diversity of police departments

Police departments are as unique as the communities they serve. And one way departments show . their sense of uniqueness is through the patches officers wear on their uniforms.

Among officers, patches become like baseball cards or coins, something to collect and trade

That holds true at the Hoopeston police department, where Sgt. Steve Bane is the official keeper of the patches.

Bane has approximately 80 insignias in his collection which "started out because people asked for ours because it's unique." Bane said.

The Hoopeston patch is an outline of the state of Illinois with an ear of corn in the middle of the state. The patch was designed in approximately 1963 by then-police chief Chuck Strink. Bane said.

In the seven or eight years since he began the collection Bane has received patches from New York. Pennsylvania, Nebraska, Tennessee, Maine, Maryland and Canada.

Some patches are reflect the distinct nature of the community served. For example, Olucy's patch depicts a white squirrel. while one of Bane's favorites, the insignia from Salem. Mass., portrays a witch on a broom.

Some of Bane's patches are reminders of times gone by, including civil defense patches. "You don't see civil defense anymore." he said. "They went to auxiliary police and ESDA (Emergency Services and Disaster Agency)."

There is one patch from the former Hoopeston Junior Law Drill Team. an organization of officers and local youngsters. "It hasn't been around for about 10 years." Bane said. "That's probably the only patch left."

Bane gets new patches from friends and coworkers, giving them Hoopeston patches to trade while on vacation.

Bane also gets patches from fellow officers he meets at police training schools.

Some departments charge for their insignias. " but those won't be added to Bane's collection. "I" won't pay for a patch." he said.


