

Police are investigating a hit-and-run accident reported Saturday. An unidentified vehicle struck four posts and the fence at McFerren Park, then left the scene.







## Coverage of Catron case made difficult by story's other side

Anyone who s covered news in Hoopeston for any length of time has to admit that while we may be the Sweetcorn Capital of the world, we re certainly not the Hot News Capital.

We don't have ex-football players accused of al-

most decapitating their ex-wives and we don't have boatloads of refugees sailing for our shores. Once every 25 years, there's a shooting and occasionally, we have a flood to boast about.

Other than that, news coverage in these parts is pretty routine.

That may be why when "big" stories happen, media goes ga-ga.

Last week's sentencing of Dennis Catron falls in that category. It's not every day (thankfully) that a former Hoopeston city and school official gcts arrested for molesting a child.

It's BIG NEWS!!!

But there's another side to covering such stories: the families left behind.

Yeah, it's BIG NEWS alright, and I guess as such, it should be splashed across newspaper pages and given prominent air time on radio and ty.

But, I keep asking myself, what about the families?

What about the youngster who was molested? What about Catron's family?

Keeping the story alive has to be hard on them. I even had people ask why the media didn't identify the alleged local "stars" of a porn video the victim says he and Catron watched.

The answer is simple. There was no need to make the families of the "stars" suffer by dragging their names through the mud.

I imagine this case was also difficult for local police because everyone who investigated it knew Catron.

We can only imagine what it must have been like for them to investigate someone who had overseen their children in school, who'd served on their city council

The police deserve an "atta boy" for their diligence in investigating the case and their professionalism in the way it was handled.

Catron's sentencing may be the end of the story

Police had tracked him to Bangkok. Thailand. Because of the cost involved, it may not be possible to bring him back.

Also, officials say, because the culture is different. Thailand officials

may be loathe to go to the trouble of extraditing him, even if he is found.

Those familiar with the culture say that in Asian countries. molesting a child does not carry the stigma it does here.

And maybe that's OK.

Oh. it's always nice to see someone punished when they've done something wrong, but maybe in this case, there are worse punishments than going to prison.

As a fugitive, Catron will never be able to return to Hoopeston. As a father on the run, he'll miss major events in his family's life.

That's got to be punishing.

Catron will spend the rest of his life looking over his shoulder, wondering if he's just one step away from being picked up.

He may not be in jail, but he'll never be free. He has lost the degree of respect, of authority, that he once had. That is a lot to lose once you've had them

In all maybe it's not such a bad thing that he's not here. The punishment he chose to inflict on himself is worse than what our judicial system could impose, and its not costing taxpayers a single cent.

And, as long as he stays away, the story will die down, people will lose interest, and his loved ones can get on with their lives.

And those of us in the media can go back to covering routine news while we wait for the next big story.
