Rossville mayor under fire for meeting, land purchase

ROSSVILLE—Mayor Merv Smith came under fire Monday night for holding what residents call an illegal meeting to make a questionable land purchase.

Trustees met Friday to discuss the purchase of what is commonly called the Deaton property adjacent to Chrisman Park on Rossville's south side. The unspecified amount of land was sold at auc-

tion just prior to Monday's board meeting.

Eight residents attended Monday's meeting, grilling Smith on the secrecy of the meeting and questioning why Smith spent \$2,000 more to purchase the property than trustees had agreed upon. Smith answered that although the media was not notified of the meeting, a notice was posted at the village office to inform the public, meeting requirements of state laws.

As for the \$17,000 purchase price, Smith agreed that trustees set \$15,000 as a maximum bid for the property, but said the other \$2,000 was donated, adding village attorney Joseph Moore of Danville said the donation was legal.

Trustee Sherry Ray said the donation came from fellow trustee Richard Kiser. Kiser, questioned after the meeting, would neither confirm or deny the donation. "I'm not at liberty to discuss that," he said.

Residents questioned why Smith would bid against other residents for the property and wondered if the property would be used as a landfill. Smith told residents they could have increased See PURCHASE on other side

Hoopeston Area schools to start recycling program

When it comes to recyclable materials such as cans and paper, few places in Hoopeston can match the amount generated by the Hoopeston Area school district.

For years, paper and aluminum cans have been tossed into the trash, but that will change in the near future, according to Ron Lewis, building and grounds supervisor.

The district will begin to recycle those materials. Lewis said. "We're going to try to get the entire district involved, especially the kids," he said. Hoopeston Area schools will begin collecting recyclable paper and aluminum in each classroom. Class collections will then be taken to larger building collections.

The recyclables will be taken to M&N Pallet


Co., which has a recycling program.

Lewis plans to meet today with representatives of each of the district's five buildings and hopes to get the program started this week.

Getting the program going will not be easy. Lewis admitted. "To make it work, it's going to take everybody working together," he said. "It's going to take the cooperation of a lot of people."

But Lewis is confident the program will succeed and that it will expand to include other items, such as milk cartons. "In the district, there's a lot of those on a daily basis," he said.

Not only does Lewis hope to cut down on the amount of material going into landfills, but he wants to teach students about the ecology, as well. See RECYCLING on other side

their bids, but resident Pam Rife disagreed, saying "why should we bid against our own tax dollars."

Smith said that while the village would fill a pond on the property with EPA-approved fill. such as concrete and dirt, there are no plans to use the site as a landfill.

Smith's actions led some residents to question his trustworthiness. "We don't trust you," said Steve Stream, whose home adjoins the property, "and given the actions you've taken the past couple of days, there's no reason why we should."

Residents were not the only ones questioning Smith's actions: Trustee Richard Birkey, who with Ray, attended the auction, said he was "embarrassed" by Smith's action. "I was shattered when I saw the mayor bidding further," he said. "I thought he was buying it for himself."

Some trustees accused Smith of implying that other bidders would harm the village. "He left us with the impression that a potential bidder's use was going to be questionable." Ray said. Kiser asked residents if they would be willing

to purchase the property. Stream replied that he would, but that as a "small man with a small billfold." he would not want to pay what the village did. Stream suggested trustees schedule an abso-

Recycling continued from other side "The idea is to get the kids involved." he said, adding that he believes students will eventually begin bringing recyclables from home, some-

thing he "wouldn't discourage." The program will not only help improve the environment, but also provide a little money for the schools.

While Hoopeston Area won't receive money for the paper it collects. some money will be paid for cans. Lewis said that money will be divided by building for special projects, but added the amount will be small. "Hey, if we get enought to plant a tree a year, that would be great." he said. lute auction and "take the financial hit and grin and bear it."

Residents said they will fight the purchase in the courts. a move they said could have been avoided. "It's a shame to spend money to protect, ourselves from our elected officials." Stream said.

Trustees agreed to consider the issue before making a final decision. "I think we, as a board, should mull this over," Braddock said.
