


Rossville-Al school district passes deficit 1995 budget

ROSSVILLE—A deficit budget¹ means Rossville-Alvin schools will have to dip into savings to get through the 1994-95 year.

The school board on Monday passed a nearly \$2.4 million budget, with anticipated expenses of \$2,385.254 and reenue of \$2,355.060.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Jack Gregory, wo has served on the board the past seven years. He has been the board's president since November.

Gregory resigned because he is going to Ohio in a job-related move.

A replacement is expected to be named at the board's Oct. 17 meeting.

Anderson said he enjoyed his job with the city, especially the diversity and challenge of it. "You never know what you're going to do from one day to the next," he said. "You're plowing snow today and cutting trees tomorrow."

Rail cars of freon to be stored on Rossville railroad tracks

Forty to fifty rail cars of freon 11 and freon 12 will be stored in Rossville for the next several weeks, according to Mayor Merv Smith.

Smith made the announcement at Monday's village board meeting.

Representatives of Allied Signal, CCX chemical Storage and the county Emergency Services and Disaster Agency and Sheriff's Department met with village officials last week to discuss the situation. Smith said.

From will be stored near the old roundhouse. Smith said, adding it poses no danger to residents. "It's basically non-hazardous," he said, unless it comes in contact with fire or red heat.


Also, he said, exposure to large amounts of the freon could cause suffocation.

To protect residents and the freen, loading and unloading valves will be locked and railroad officials will monitor the cars several times each week.

The freon is expected to remain in the village for six weeks to two months.

The challenge came in learning to do new things: Nothing in Anderson's work history. including 21 years in the Air Force and four years on the Alaskan oil rigs, prepared him for working in the street and alley department. Anderson also enjoyed working with his employees, who he said are hard-working and dedicated. "My guys will start work at 7 a.m. and give you a whole week's worth of work," he said. Anderson's last day was marked by a going away party, something he has mixed feelings about. "I don't like parties," he said. "but way down deep, I really appreciate it."
