

Rossville trustees approve purchase of local pond

The Rossville village board put its final approval on the purchase of approximately 23 acres of property, including a pond, despite the fact that the pond could be contaminated.

The board voted 4-0, with trustee Richard Kiser abstaining, to purchase the Deaton property. approximately 23 acres adjacent to Chrisman park, for \$17,000

The property contains a pond which village officials plan to use for clean fill.

Trustees said they voted for the purchase on the advice of village attorney Joseph Moore.

When questioned by resident Dave Rayfield. Mayor Merv Smith said there is a possibility the pond may be contaminated from refuse dumped

Trustee Sherry Ray said that if the board did not proceed with the purchase, the village would be sued. "Basically, we're between a rock and a hard place." she said.

Smith said he was told, in phone calls to the Illinois EPA or the Illinois Dept. of Transportation, that each organization "has no problem with" the village's plans. After the meeting, however. Smith said plans to use the pond as a clean fill site are outside IDOT jursidiction.

The village purchased the land at an auction last, month, with \$15,000 in village funds and a \$2,000 donation from Kiser.



Recipients must have proof of income, proof of address and social security cards for everyone in the household.


