Guys and ghouls will have lots of fun this Halloween weekend.

Events begin Friday with the Good Shepherd

Lutheran Church chicken noodle dinner, serving 4:30 - 8 p.m.. Prices are \$5 for adults, \$2.50 for children 6-12 and five and under, free.

Friday is also the day of the Special Olympics' apple sale in Hoopeston.

On Saturday, the United Methodist Church bazaar and luncheon will be held from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The Hoopeston AMVETS post is also sponsoring a bazaar.

From 8-9 a.m. Saturday, artists may enter their jack-o-lanterns in the pumpkin judging contest. At 11 a.m., registration begins for the Halloween costume parade. Both events will take place downtown.

Winners for the jack-o-lantern contest and costume parade will be announced at noon.

At 1 p.m., a special Halloween movie will be shown at the Lorraine Theater, followed by the Jaycees children's Halloween party from 3-5 p.m.

Monday, ghosts and goblins will abound during trick-or-treat hours, which are 5-8 p.m. in Hoopeston and 5-9 p.m. in Rossville.

Also on Monday, trick-or-treaters are invited to the Hoopeston Nursing Home from 6:30-7:30 p.m. to visit with residents and receive treats.

Joanne Turngren, activity director, said the activity is something residents look forward to every year. "They like to visit with the children," she said.

Turngren requests that trick-ortreaters not come earlier than 6:30 because it will interfere with the residents' dinner hour.

Trick-or-treating at the nursing home rounds out a day of spooky happenings for residents, she said.

Employees are expected to dress in costume and an in-house pumpkin decorating contest is planned.

Hoopeston Area school score above average on report cards

Hoopeston Area schools get good marks when it comes to areas of the school report card.

A summary handed out by Supt. Don Dean at last week's board meeting shows Hoopeston schools meeting or exceeding goals set by the state.

In reading, 74 percent of students met or exceeded goals. In grade 6, the total was 73 percent; grade 8, 75 percent; and grade 10, 76 percent.

In math, 88 percent of eighth graders met or exceeding goals; in sixth grade, 88 percent; and



eighth and 10th grades, 74 percent.

In writing, 82 percent of third graders met or exceeded goals, while 100 percent of sixth graders did. In eighth grade, 93 percent met or exceeded, while 76 percent of 10th graders did.

In science, 85 percent of fourth graders met at least minimal standards; 87 percent of seventh graders achieved that goal; and 75 percent of 11th graders.

In social sciences. 79 percent of fourth graders met or exceeded goals, while 92 percent of seventh graders did, and 86 percent of 11th graders.

The district has a 92 percent graduation rate, compared with 78 percent statewide. The ACT average score is 20.1, compared with 21 statewide.


