Grant Township residents to see higher tax bills in new year

Grant Township residents will see an increase in their tax bills following action taken by Grant Township trustees Monday night.

At their regular monthly meeting, trustees unaminously approved a 25.1 percent increase in the road and bridge fund and a 24.3 percent increase in the general town fund.

The increases will raise \$246,432 for roads and bridges and \$206,220 for town fund items, such as general assistance.

Township officials had earlier estimated the higher levy will add approximately \$25 to the tax bill on a \$40,000 home.

On other business, road commissioner Jim Crouch said painting a township bridge guard did nothing to prevent vandals from spray painting slogans on it.

The unidentified bridge was painted by township workers to cover existing graffiti, Crouch said. "Within 72 hours after we painted it,

Mail early for timely Christmas delivery: postmaster

"The sooner, the better" is the motto for mailing Christmas cards and packages, according to Hoopeston postmaster Paul Ziemnisky.

The local office will deliver more than 300,000 pieces of mail this holiday season, or 75,000 each week during December.

The worst of it will come after the Christmas season, however, with clearance sale catalogs, sweepstakes information and tax packets.

Also, late December mail is expected to be heavier as people mail items before the Jan. 1 postal increase.

In unrelated business, assessor Teresa Sollars said her office is accepting applications for the senior citizens tax freeze under the Homestead Exemption - even though the applications may be no good.

Sollars said state officials allowed only two days to accept applications after the last legislative session, but that the local office had no paperwork to accept applications.

Applications are being accepted in case the program is extended by legislators during the next session, she said. Applications will be accepted through the end of this month for the 1994 tax year, and will be accepted from January through may for the 1995 year.

In other action, trustees approved a one-year agreement with the city of Hoopeston for fire protection. The township will pay the city \$7,500.






The deadline for parcel post, or fourth class, the least expensive way to send packages in the U.S., is also today-



✓ Do type or print addresses rather than writing them.

✓ Mail early in the day.

✓ Clear sidewalks and curbside mailboxes of snow as a courtesy to mail carriers.
