

Hoopeston in running for best of American small towns

A national company has chosen Hoopeston as a candidate for one of the best small towns in America.

Century 21[®] selected Hoopeston as one of the 21 best small towns in the north central U.S., based on a recommendation from Terry Forshier, owner of the local Century 21[®] office.

According to The Leader, a company publication, communities were selected based on some criteria used in Norman Crampton's book, "The 100 Best Small Towns in America."

Cities selected were "stand-alone communities with economic vitality that provide services, institutional support and provide jobs," according to an article in The Leader. Nominees are also serviced by one or more Century 21^{*} offices.

Forshier said nominations were based on a questionnaire asking brokers "normal questions like why they think their town is the best." Despite the fact that he also owns offices in Champaign, Danville, Watseka and Kankakee, Forshier said he nominated Hoopeston because "it's my home town."

In his nomination, Forshier said "people in Hoopeston know their neighbors; don't have to lock their doors to run to the store; and most don't even lock their cars at night. It's small town living at its best."

Small towns, such as Hoopeston, "have a higher standard" than large cities where crime is rampant, Forshier said. "Every time you go to the city, it's hard," he said. "We're not used to putting (a car) alarm on and one of those steering wheel brakes."

Forshier was somewhat surprised the company selected his nomince. "It just goes to shou you that if you don't blow your own horn, nobody hears you," he said.

"I think it's an outstanding place." Winners will be announced this quarter.

Howard Industries workers put in final day Monday

MILFORD-The final 52 employees of Howard Industries said goodbye to their jobs after Monday's shift.

The group, the only employees not receiving lay-off notices last Friday, showed up for work despite being warned that they might not be paid, said Connie Bell, president of Local 7761 of the United International Paper Union, representing plant workers.


It was not loyalty that made employees show up, however. "We were afraid if we didn't, they might do something to our unemployement since we didn't have lay-off notices," she said.


Some workers may be called back to the plant to inventory supplies, she said.

The decision to close the plant came after employees voted 89-54 last Friday not to accept a concessions package offered by the company.

The package would have cut wages one dollar per hour, increased employees' insurance contributions and decreased vacation time.

Bell said accepting the concessions package would have set workers back by approximately eight years.
