

NMI president cites discrepancy in stock shares

The former president of a defunct Hoopeston business says company owners sold more shares of stock than were actually available.

Paul Harmon, former president of National Microsystems of Illinois, Inc. appeared at a creditors' hearing Friday, held after the company filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy last month.

The company, which made testing equipment for the auto industry, closed its Hoopeston plant las month.

"The number of shares that they claimed they had and the number of shares from Dun & Bradstreet - that's how I found out about it - they didn't match," Harmon said.

After the hearing, Harmon said he did not remember the actual number of shares listed either by the company or Dun & Bradstreet, but that the company showed more than the financial reporting agency.

Questioned by bankruptcy trustee Steve Miller about the number of stockholders, Harmon said he has "been asking that question since the day I came there," adding he believes shareholders include company owner John Dryden, his daughter, Nancy Dryden, Joyce Kamis and former company attorney Curtis Quindry.

The city of Hoopeston, which invested \$300,000 in the company, is also listed as a shareholder and "there may be more," Harmon said.

The former president disagreed with the value of listed assets, including \$35,250 in office equip-See NMI on other side

No crystal ball for predicting grain markets: UI prof

Predicting what grain markets will do is a challenge, according to a University of Illinois professor and extension economist.

Dr. Darrel Good spoke Thursday to approximately 25 farmers at a seminar sponsored by the Hoopeston Public Library and Demeter, Inc.


"We could make this a fairly short meeting if I could tell you what day and at what price the corn market would top out," Good said. "If I could do that, I wouldn't be here."

Instead, Good suggested farmers look at events in the last 18 months, including the North American Free Trade Agreement, General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, record corn and soybeans and soybean production, droughts in Australia and South Africa, and something "the explosion of the consumption of agricultural products in China."

Price forecasting for 1995 will be based largely on production. "There's a surprisingly strong world demand for those record harvests," Good said. "The market says we need another big crop. The question is how big will it be?"

The 1995 Farm Bill will affect prices and other aspects of agriculture for the next five years, especially if set-aside programs are discontinued. "There's a lot of uncertainty facing the market," he said.

Other factors which will affect markets include whether the dollar is strong compared to other currency, weather patterns and Asian economic growth. ment and \$93,145 in production equipment. "You'd probably be lucky to get \$15,000 for everything in that building," Harmon said. As for inventory, Harmon said most is "outdated components...that were built in the early 1980s. Ten percent of that inventory, at very best, was usable when we were in production."

Other assets include what Harmon called a "dip account" at Community Bank in Hoopeston, which contained more than \$4,000, and an employe payroll tax account containing \$400-\$500. Harmon testified that some company records are in the factory. As for corporation records, "I'm pretty sure that John, Nancy and Joyce have them," he said.

The only creditor to question Harmon was attorney Tom Goodwin, representing Decaturbased Hoopeston Associates, which sold the building to National Microsystems.

Asked by Goodwin about the condition of the building, Harmon said the roof leaks extensively. "As a matter of fact," Harmon said, "in the winter of 1994, in the production area, there was ice on the floor."

Harmon said he continues to work with officials concerning the bankruptcy, spending \$1,000 of his own money in the process. Currently on unemployment compensation, he said he has done this because "I made a lot of friends here."

Harmon denied reports that he is starting a business similar to National Microsystems in the Danville area, saying he continues to operate program management consulting business he started in 1983. Feb. 28: Sausage pizza, salad, applesauce, milk.



No tickets or injuries were reported in an accident at 4:07 p.m. Wednesday on Route 9.




