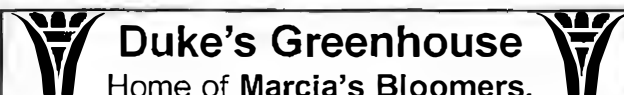

## Supreme Court refuses to hear landfill case

The Hoopeston city council will once again vote on a proposed 120-acre landfill expansion.

Officials were notified Thursday that the Illinois Supreme Court would not hear an appeal filed by Citizens Against Ruining the Environment (C.A.R.E.) that the expansion be disallowed. The court gave no reason for the refusal.

According to attorney Joe Moore, C.A.R.E. co-counsel, the issue will now go back to the council, which approved the expansion in April 1993.

The original vote was split 4-4, with Mayor Bob Ault casting the tie-breaking yes vote.

Based on statements made by candidates before Tuesday's election, the council, including four members who did not vote originally, will still be

divided 4-4.

Incumbents Sue Comstock, Drew Allen and Bill Goodwine voted for the expansion. Aldermen Mark Drollinger, who was appointed earlier this year and re-elected Tuesday, also favors the expansion.

Opposing the proposal are incumbents John Haughee and Mike Eckersley and newly-elected members Dave Borders and Harold Cox.

Ault would not confirm those numbers. "I would hate to make a prediction like this," he said. "We're still as a jury. Anything I say on that could be used against me."

While not commenting on the possible vote,

## Locked box opened for Hoopeston library vote results

It took an order from the Vermilion County state's attorney's office, but vote tallies were released Thursday for the new Hoopeston Public Library district.

"Very unofficial results" show the six candidates listed on the ballot and one of two write-in candidates were chosen, said Lynn Foster, Vermilion County clerk.

Janet Crouch was the top vote-getter with 1,058, followed by Larry Jahn, 1,033; Don Sherrill, 1,026; Sherry Miller and Dale Fry, each with 1,015; and Mark Conolly, 1,005.

Candidate Tony Hasbargen got 63 write-in votes and will be on the board.

A second write-in candidate, Dave Bell, received 58 votes and was not elected.

Counting votes was delayed following Tues-

day's election because the write-in votes were sealed in an election box and sealed, Foster said.

The box was to remain sealed for 60 days and was opened only after Foster's office received a legal order from the state's attorney.

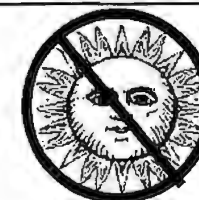

Ault did say Thursday's announcement was pre-  
dictable. "I didn't think the Supreme Court would  
hear a matter of that nature because they're filled  
up with other matters," he said.

Before the council votes, the high court must  
notify the Appellate Court of its decision, Moore  
said. That court must then notify the state Pollu-  
tion Control Board, which will, in turn, notify the  
council.

The process reverses the course of appeals filed  
since the council approved the expansion. Follow-  
ing the approval, C.A.R.E. appealed to the Pollu-  
tion Control Board, which overturned the coun-  
cil's vote because the board felt the council's writ-  
ten decision did not address whether the expan-  
sion is needed in the proposed 31-county service  
area.

That issue is the first of nine criteria used to de-  
termine whether an expansion will be granted.

Illinois Landfills, Inc. then appealed to the Ap-  
pellate Court, which overturned the Pollution  
Control Board's decision.

C.A.R.E. then petitioned for leave to appeal to  
the Supreme Court.

When the council rehears the issue, no new evi-  
dence will be allowed, according to Joliet attorney  
Tom Thanas, who was hearing officer at the origi-  
nal vote.

The council's vote, when taken, could be ap-  
pealed again, Moore said. "It could be appealed  
on the evidence on criterion one because that  
hasn't been heard yet," he said. "Either side could  
appeal it."

Landfill officials are not focusing on what could  
happen, but are happy about Thursday's decision.

"We are pleased with the ruling of the Supreme  
Court and we'll move forward with our applica-  
tion," said spokesman Jim Van Weelden.
