# Drug use up, leads to violent crime: MEG leader

Local students are using drugs.

While that is not new, the number of students using drugs may surprise some people, according to Mike Bane.

Bane, squad leader for the Vermilion County Metropolitan Enforcement Group (V-MEG), spoke at Monday's Neighborhood Watch meet-

"I would not hesitate to say that 80 percent of kids at that high school have used drugs." Banes said. "A lot of people don't want to recognize that. I'm not trying to scare anybody, but there are a lot more drugs out here than a lot of people believe."

Three drugs are prevalent locally, Bane said: marijuana, cocaine and crack, a cocaine derivative. "There is crack in this area," he said. "There is crack in this community."

The increase in drug use has lead to an increase

in other crimes, especially thefts, as users steal merchandise to pay for drugs. "Drugs are a big cause of what's happening to you folks here," Bane said, referring to a rash of recent burglaries.

Merchandise, such as video cassette recorders. are pawned to pay for drugs. A VCR will purchase \$50 to \$75 worth of crack, Bane said. Televisions bring less "becaue they're harder to get rid

Fighting drug use is difficult for several reasons. Bane said.

First, most police agencies are understaffed. "We're not big enough to covere Danville by itself and have an effect." Bane said.

A manpower shortage is combined with an increased number of reports of drug use, he said.

Bane also blamed the justice system for releasing offenders, freeing them to sell drugs again.

# Local letter carriers take part in national food drive

Postal workers, used to leaving things, will be collecting items on Saturday, May 13.

That is the day postal carriers will participate in the National Letter Carriers Association food drive.

Residents are asked to place nonperishable food items near their mailboxes for postal workers to collect. "As we come along with the mail, we'll pick it up." said Douglas "Pat" Roark, president of Hoopeston and Rossville Local #977 of the National Letter Carriers.

Carriers will be assisted by retired postal workers and members of Boy Scout troop 138. Each

group in specially-designated pick-up trucks, will also collect food, Roark said. A container will also be in the post office lobby for postal box customers.

This is the first time local letter carriers have participated in the nationwide food drive, Roark said. Last year, approximately 600 post offices took part. This year, the number grew to 1,100.

Roark hopes local results are similar to last year's drive in Paxton, which netted more than a ton of food.

All food collected will go to the Grant Township Food Cupboard.



Drug investigation is not a speedy process, Bane told those present.

"Our job is not to respond to citizen complaints to a person's house," Bane said. "Our goal is to buy large amounts of drugs from somebody to put them in jail for a long period of time. That takes time."

Bane urged residents not to be discouraged, but to take action to help.

"Get the license numbers of cars (residents think may be involved in drug traffic) and the make and model," Bane said. "Then call the police. Most of these people have got records."

Bane warned against vigilanteism. "Don't get mad and go across the street after these people. he said.

Bane also suggested residents write to state legislators asking that one-party consent for eavesdropping be made legal in Illinois.

Currently, law enforcement officials must have consent of both parties to record conversations. Bane said that hampers investigations.

Bane admitted the war against drugs sometimes seems futile. Last year, MEG handled 45 more cases than the previous year and this year will beat that, he said.

"It's kind of a bleak outlook," he said.
