

Local commodities program schedules last giveaway

Grant Township officials have scheduled their last commodities giveaway.

The program, which offers free food to needy people, is being eliminated because of federal cutbacks, according to officials.

The last giveaway will be from 1-3 p.m. Wednesday at the Grant Township garage, 701 E. Orange. Participants must present an updated blue commodities card.

"We're really disappointed," said Carol Flint, Grant Township supervisor. "It's been really needed in the community. It was something that was always fun to do - you got to meet with the people."

Flint said the commodities program was initiated by the federal government, then turned over to the states.

The Illinois Department of Public Aid contracted with the Salvation Army in Danville to oversee the program. In turn, Grant Township subcontracted with the Salvation Army to hold the program locally.

Neither Public Aid nor Salvation Army representatives could be reached for comment.

In the last few years, "we noticed that it was cut back a little bit and cut back a little bit." Flint said.

Cutbacks were seen in the amount of commodities received and the frequency of giveaways. which were held monthly, but have recently been held every two months. Flint said.

At giveaways, those eligible receive free surplus food, including butter, peanut butter, vegetables, juices, flour, corn meal and rice - "whatever (the government) had a surplus of," Flint said.

In the approximately 14 years the Hoopeston program has been in existance, many residents have been helped. "We can reminsee about when we used to have it at the old township building (at 211 S. Market) and people used to line up all the way to where McMurray Insurance is (at 201 E. Main)," Flint said.

Senior citizens will be most affected by the cut.



Of the approximately 200 people participating bi-monthly, roughly 75 percent have been senior citizens, Flint said.

What will happen to the elderly who participated is still unclear. "You worry about them," Flint said, "but you hope they know the Food Cupboard is here."

The Grant Township Food Cupboard, which also provides food for the needy, has more stringent requirements than the commodities give-away. However, "a lot of people who signed up for commodities are eligible for Food Cupboard." Flint said.


