Rain, rain go away Weather causes delays in pumpkin, corn planting

Rain, the life's blood in a farming community such as Hoopeston, is putting a damper on local farming efforts.

Stokely USA is 30 percent behind schedule in corn planting and has only five percent of it pumpkin crop in the ground, said production manager Cliff Luke.

"At present, we've got about 70 percent planted on sweet corn," Luke said. "In a normal year, we'd be done - or close to it - by now."

As for pumpkins, "we're not too good," Luke said. "If we get in any time in the next five days and we should - we should be in pretty good shape."

According to Stokely totals, the local area. which normally receives 6.32 inches of rain in April and May, has received 10.74 inches, nearly 170 percent above normal.

Heat units are running about normal, Luke said.

"Quite a bit" of early corn is already up, Luke said, adding the company plants that in a 100mile radius. Late corn, planted about a week ago. "is just sitting there."

Planting on time is more important for sweet corn than pumpkins. Luke said. Corn has a short maturity level and must be picked when ready. Pumpkins, however, can "sort of lay there and sun themselves until we're ready to pick them." he said.

The longer maturity level of pumpkins means the company can ride out more rain expected this week and still have a fairly good crop. "Hopefully. we can get a bunch of them planted before (Thurs-See PLANTING on other side

Girls basketball: Camp began May 30 and will run through June 3.


Girls in grades three to five will meet from 8-9:30 a.m. Girls in grades six through eight will meet from 9:30 to 11
