



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1975 revisited or 'Maybe I should have my head examined'

As I sat through the recent Hoopeston Area High School graduation, I was touched by the optimism of the young speakers, by the regret they felt at leaving one another.

And then I thought "just give them 20 years."

There's nothing like a class reunion to strike unspeakable dread into the hearts of otherwise perfectly sane people. It's almost time for the 20th re-

union of the Milford Township High School class of 1975.

This is the third "official" reunion since graduation (get-togethers at the Milford Fun Days beer tent don't count), and for some reason, it's the toughest one.

I recently read an article which enumerated the hysterical things people will do prior to their class reunions.

For example, if someone's going to go on a diet. he's more likely to do it before a reunion, especially the 20th.
