# Search begins for new Grant Township trustee

Grant Township officials have started the search for a new township trustee.

Long-time trustee Carl Weber resigned at Tuesday's board meeting, said Carol Flint, Grant Township supervisor.

Weber cited health reasons for the resignation, which is effective immediately, she said.

Flint must now appoint, and other trustees approve, a replacement for Weber, who has served on the board for 31 years.

Other trustees include Stanley Lithgow, Bill Boose and Fred Ward.

Flint has 60 days to find a replacement, who,

like Weber, must be a Republican.

Some township residents have already expressed interest in the position. Flint said letters of interest have been submitted by people who learned of Weber's pending resignation.

Filling the position will not be easy, however. "He's one of those you hate to see go," Flint said. "He's been here ever since I have."

# Rep. Black intervenes, South Fifth St. may get stop sign

A stop sign may be going up at South Fifth and Maple streets, thanks to intervention from a state representative.

Rep. Bill Black (R-Danville) interceded to have the sign placed to slow traffic, said Hoopeston resident Jim Richards.

Richards has worked to have traffic slowed since his granddaughter was struck in April by a car on South Fifth.

The driver in the accident was not ticketed and police said speed was not a factor in the incident.

City officials had said putting a stop sign on the street was not possible because the street was repaired last year using \$700,000 of state and federal funds. Officials said Illinois Department of Transportation regulations prohibited a stop sign. However, after Black intervened. IDOT decided it "would not, in effect. interfere with what the city needed to do to make it safe." Richards said. IDOT's reversal of policy "should not interfere with future funding" of city projects, Richards said.


The IDOT decision was discussed at a city street and alley committee meeting Monday, Richards said.

Committee chairman Mark Drollinger would not comment on the meeting, saying only that "there are going to be some changes."

Richards said the committee agreed to recommend to the full city council that the stop sign be erected. The recommendation is expected to be made at the June 20 city council meeting.


Although pleased a stop sign will be put up, Richards said regulation is only one of a needed three-pronged approach also involving enforcement of speed laws and education of children and adults.
