







Fifth St. stop sign should not affect future IDOT projects

Going against Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) regulations should not cost Hoopeston either now or in the future.

The Hoopeston city council is expected to vote Tuesday on whether a stop sign should be put at South Fifth and Maple streets.

The stop sign would be erected to slow traffic on the arterial street which was resurfaced last year. Problems arose because the street has no stop signs between Orange and Main, allowing drivers to exceed the 25 m.p.h. speed limit.

According to IDOT regulations, since the street was repaired with state and federal funds, stop signs are prohibited.

But Rep. Bill Black (R-Danville) who intereceded on behalf of concerned Hoopeston residents, said IDOT will allow Hoopeston residents to determine what is best for the community without penalty.

Black said Wednesday that, should officials decide to put up the sign, the city will not have to

Black said he became involved with the issue last March after communicating with the Tom Spears family last March.

Black contacted IDOT officials in Paris, whom he called a "pretty sharp, reasonable bunch of people to work with." and explained that the street is in a residential area and near a school.

"I just wanted to make sure IDOT didn't sit down in Paris and say 'Nope, we're not going to do it." Black said.
