



Burning trash leads to blaze at pallet company

A burning trash pile is being blamed for a blaze at M&N Pallet Thursday afternoon.

More than 100 firefighters from five fire departments 'battled' for approximately three hours. Thursday to extinguish the fire, which consumed a large storage shed at the pallet company's 900 S. Second Ave. site.

Four firemen were taken from the scene by Hoopeston Ambulance to Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital, where they were treated for heat exhaustion, said Hoopeston fire chief Brian Laird.

Embers from a trash fire near the shed apparently were carried by the wind and started the fire. Laird said. The Illinois Fire Marshall's office is not expected to be called to investigate the fire.

Inside the shed were several vehicles, an antique sweetcorn husker and empty barrels.

Residents near the fire scene reported hearing

explosions after the fire started, but Laird said he had not investigated those reports yet.

The shed approximately 200' by 60' shed was destroyed, but firemen managed to save a second structure next to the ruined building.

Piece of history caught in blaze

A piece of Hoopeston history was caught in Thursday's fire at M&N Pallet Co.

A 1942 FMC double head corn husker was stored on a hay rack in the shed. The husker is owned by the Hoopeston Jaycees and used annually during the National Sweet Corn Festival.

The machine, with it's cast iron frame and electric motor, is no longer produced by the company.

The extent of damage to the husker was not known at press time.

School board discusses extra-curricular policy changes

"Birds of a feather flock together" sums up proposed changes in the extra-curricular policy for Hoopeston Area schools.

Changes, developed by a newly-formed extracurricular council, was discussed at Thursday's Hoopeston Area school board meeting.

Under the biggest policy change, would punish not only students who drink or take drugs at "road parties" would be punished, but students who attend such parties would face punishment, as well.

The drug/alcohol proposal would be a two-step process, according to Mark Conolly, Hoopeston Area High School principal.

Under the first step, a student found guilty of using at a party or attending a party where drugs or alcohol is used would be suspended from 3 percent of his extra-curricular activity. For non-athletic activities, such as drama club, the council would designate a time period equal to the 30 percent.

Penalties would carry over to the next extracurricular activity or next school year.

The proposed change came under fire from some board members and was defended by school coaches and activity sponsors.

Board president Ed Layden Jr. argued that parents and police are responsible for students during off-school hours, while member Gary Miller said the policy might go to far.

"I don't think we can take on the responsibility of kids' actions 24 hours a day." Miller said. "We're basically eliminating any due process for a kid who's there. Under this rule, we're going to sacrifice good kids to catch the bad ones."

But Quentin Ryder, girls track coach, disagreed, saying students who choose to attend such parties "lose their innocence.
