Local students, teacher praise high-tech college classes

A new way of taking college courses is getting good reviews from students and teachers.

The distance learning program, which uses cameras and televisions to broadcast classes among six schools, is a time-saver, according to those involved in the class.

Larry Lobb, a retired Hoopeston Area High School teacher, is the instructor for a distance learning algebra class. "It's really exciting and seems it could turn into a 'wave of the future' type thing," he said. "I think this is going to work out to be just as effective (as traditional classes.)"

As the instructor, Lobb wears a microphone with an infrared sensor. A camera follows his movement around the Hoopeston Area classroom, broadcasting his lessons to his five students in Hoopeston, but also the five at Danville Area Community College, three at Georgetown-Ridge Farm and one at Jamaica.

The program also includes Westville, Danville High School and United Samaritans Medical Center.

Cameras in the classrooms show the classes at

large. When one student answers a question, the camera focuses on that student.

Lobb's classes can be recorded and played back if one site has a power outage. However, "if we have a power outage in Hoopeston, we just all go home," he said.

Tests have proven to be no problem. A courier service provides a 24-hour turnaround time and each site is equipped with a fax machine/copier, Lobb said.

Making the transition from being a "traditional, very traditional teacher - chalkboard mostly," has not been difficult for Lobb, but he admits it is different from a regular classroom. "As far as instruction in concerned, the only thing different is you have to focus your eyes on the camera," Lobb said. "I'm used to doing it in front of the kids. You have to pause and ask questions a lot. You have to bring each side into play."

Clothing can also be a problem. "You have to be careful what you wear," Lobb said, adding one person wore white and, in front of the white

screen, looked like a head and hands with no body.

Lobb admitted he was "intimidated" by the system at first. During his 29 years of teaching, he saw the advent of calculators and computers in the classroom, and now cameras. "I never dreamed I'd see it, let alone be a part of it," he said.

Students also like the new system. "I think it's really neat," said Tina Andel, who attends Lobb's math class, as well as a distance learning psychology class. "You don't have to go very far to meet people you've never seen before, and you learn something."

Lobb said the cameras bother some students, including one at a remote site who dropped the class, but for Andel, they are not a problem. "It doesn't bother me," she said. "I don't find it hard

Andel, who works a full time job in Lafayette, Ind., likes that she does not have to drive to Danville.

There are drawbacks to the system, though, according to Andel and fellow student Jeremiah Eyrich.

"There are some little things they should've worked out before they started," Andel said. "Sometimes, it takes too long."

Time is one thing Eyrich doesn't like about the class, saying lessons move more slowly than regular classrooms. "It slows things down," he said.

Despite problems, teachers and students look forward to more distance learning classes.

Lobb said he and Dan Reed, Hoopeston's distance learning coordinator, discussed the possibility of someday offering classes from across the nation. "The idea, the thought of doing that, just boggles the mind," Lobb said.
