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Council OKs apartment complex, turns down Migrant Council

Local senior citizens will have new housing, but the Hoopeston branch of the Illinois Migrant Council must find a new home following action at Tuesday's Hoopeston city council meeting.

In a 7-1 vote, the council approved a recommendation from the city plan commission annexing and rezoning five lots at Dice St. and McKinley Ave. Mick Duckett of Danville will build a 12-unit senior citizen apartment complex on the site.

The property, originally zoned B1 commercial will be rezoned R3, multi-family residential.

Alderman Harold Cox voted against the complex. After the meeting, Cox explained that he believes the complex will block a home located on an adjoining lot.

In a 1-7 vote, the council rejected a plan commission recommendation that a conditional use permit be granted at 406 E. Thompson.

Jose Torres, property owner, requested the change, which would have allowed him to rent the property to the Migrant Council.

The council, which provides social services to migrant farm workers, had been located on Bank St. However, the building was sold to another business.

Aldermen questioned whether the property would allow sufficient area for parking and also whether increased traffic would create a problem for neighbors.

Joe Rodrigues, Migrant Council social service worker, said the agency would see 15 to 20 clients per day, scheduled at half-hour intervals, resulting in little traffic increase and four cars in the parking area.

Although Rodrigues presented a petition signed by area neighbors, council member Susan Comstock said none of the immediate neighbors signed the petition.

Also, aldermen Dave Borders and Harold Cox said they received calls from residents asking that the change be turned down.

Alderman Bill Goodwine suggested that phone calls
