Hoopeston school board, teachers ink two-year agreement

Hoopeston Area teachers have a new two-year contract following Thursday's district board of education meeting.

The new agreement increases the current base salary of \$18,700 by \$750 this year and \$700 next year, said Superintendent Don Dean.

The contract also calls for:

Done step added at the top of the schedule. Nondegreed teachers' salary ranges will top out after 15 years, up one year; bachelor's degree from 16 to 17 years; Master's degree, 18 to 19; and certificate of advanced studies from 19 to 20.

□increased mileage, from 20 cents to 31 cents.

□increased tuition reimbursement. The new rate will be \$50 per credit hour, up from \$40.

an increase in number of accumulated sick days. Currently teachers may accumulate a maximum of 190 days. That was raised to 210 days.

Imore money for those who perform crowd control. ticket taking, scorekeeping and other such activities. The rate was changed from \$15 nightly to \$25.

The district to pay a larger portion of health care costs. The district now pays \$170, but will pay \$180

during the first year of the contract and \$190 during the second year.

The contract was hammered out during four meetings between negotiating committees from the school board and Hoopeston Area Education Association, said Gary Miller, the board's chief negotiator.

The teachers' union ratified the agreement May 28, Dean said.

In other action, the board

granted a 35-cent pay increase for non-certified employees.

□accepted resignations from Cliff McClure as dean of students and Velma Bird, first grade teacher.

□hired Suzzette Hesser, fifth grade; Annette Lockhart, first grade; Laura Sellers, high school math; Kathy Vines, social worker; and Scott Watson, high school health/head football coach/assistant boys basketball coach.

□accepted a \$17,611 bid from FBI Buildings for a pole barn; and \$15,285 for a chair lift at John Greer Grade School.



County treasurer lists deposits, interest on county funds

A total of \$17,455,263.81 was invested in time deposits and U.S. treasury bonds during May, according to Vermilion County treasurer Sue Stine.

The money is earning betweeen 4.53 percent and 9.1 percent.

The total amount held by the treasurer's office is \$21.554.635.41.

Investments of local interest include: Palmer American National Bank, \$2,902,004.96; Community Bank of Hoopeston, \$452,859.94; First National Bank of Rossville, \$101,798.18; and Kankakee Federal Savings, \$100,00.

Other deposits include: First National Bank of Danville, \$1,102,863.50; First Midwest Bank,

\$3,549,177.49; Allerton State Bank, \$101,840.26; First National Bank of Catlin, \$1,102,863.50 and First National Bank of Fairmount, \$151,985.32.

Also, First National Bank of Georgetown, \$107,674.06; First National Bank of Ogden, \$1,281,774.93; First National Bank of Westville, \$101,797.47; First of America, \$101,527.98; First Ridge Farm State Bank, \$5,382,617.45; Oakwood State Bank, \$3,195.73; Sidell State Bank, \$102,668.57; and U.S. Treasury bonds, \$4,612,132.97.
