Paper files suit against city for alleged meetings act violations

A civil suit is charging Hoopeston officials with violating the Open Meetings Act.

The suit, filed last Friday by the Hoopeston Chronicle. alleges the city's revolving loan committee violated the act by illegally closing at least two meetings to the public.

The meetings were held to discuss applications for the revolving loan fund, which provides funds for new or existing businesses. Applicants' financial information was to be discussed during the closed portions of the meetings.

The suit alleges that the committee's actions do not meet any of the 22 specific exemptions under which meetings may be closed, said media attorney Donald Craven.

Craven, of Springfield, handles legal work for the Illinois Press Association.

The suit is the latest move in a situation started last November, Craven said, when the Chronicle requested Vermilion County State's Attorney Michael Clary investigate the committee for holding a closed meeting. Clary ruled the committee had violated the act, but declined to prosecute.

Following an April 1 committee meeting, the paper again contacted Clary. In a May 20 letter, Clary issued

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an opinion stating the committee seemed to "be doing its best to satisfy the conflicting requirements of the Open Meetings Act and the Small Business Development Act."

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The Small Business Development Act applies to funds from the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, which includes the city's revolving loan funds.

That law states that some financial information provided by applicants must be kept confidential.

Clary requested an opinion from the Illinois Attorney General's office on the conflict and suggested loan applications be handled administratively, but alderman Bill Goodwine, revolving loan committee chairman, said there are not enough city employees to implement the suggestion.

Committee meetings held following Clary's ruling, including one on June 3 and another June 20, included portions closed to the public.

The suit seeks an injunction against future closed revolving loan committee meetings, Craven said. When asked how the city could meet the requirements of both the Open Meetings Act and Small Business Development Act, he replied "I don't know. It's not my job."

Furthermore, Craven said, city officials could request that a state legislator introduce a bill to change the Open Meetings Act. "The act has been changed before and it will be changed again."

Meanwhile, he said, "these folks go merrily on their way holding closed meetings. The city very simply refuses to comply with the act, knowing they're in violation, and that's not acceptable."


The lawsuit is necessary because without it, "they would continue to violate (the act)," Craven said.

Goodwine said he "does not know much" about the lawsuit because he has not received information on it vet.

However, he believes Clary's ruling "totally undercuts their whole suit."
